This year will see governors elected in Ohio, Iowa, Kentucky, Maryland, New Jersey and Massachusetts, so 1895 will not be barren in political interest.

When it comes to merit of the highest order the first of all birds beyond comparison is the hen. It adds to the wealth of the country every year in eggs alone \$135,000,000, or about the combined value of our output of iron and wool.

The new buildings begun in New York city during the last four months will cost \$32,535,260, which is considerably more than double the value of the building operations in the same period a year ago.

It is safe to say that there will be no war between Russia and Japan, despite Russian bluster. The people of France and Germany are not going to allow their governments to actively aid Russia, and Russia knows better than to attack Japan single-handed at present.

Secretary Carlisle promised a national surplus of \$29,000 dollars for the current year, and senator Gorman said the deficit would be more than \$50,000. Gorman claims to be ahead, but he isn't worth a cent as a prophet.

A dark horse won the prize on the republican track in 1880, and the same thing may happen in 1896. Still, the chances are that some one of the racers—Reed, McKinley, Harrison Allison or Morton—will be the winner.

The report from Cuba that 20,000 more Spanish soldiers for service in Cuba are sent for shows the falsity of the recent stories that the insurrection was on the point of collapse. Havana has been a distributing center of misinformation ever since the disturbance began.

Georgia is expecting an immense peach crop, large orchards having been planted by settlers from the north. Within ten miles of one Georgia town 13,000 acres are in peaches. Eleven companies formed in Ohio, with a capital of \$300,000, have set out over 8,000 acres in trees in one county.

The London Lancet admits that insomnia is increasing in modern life, and that its cause is not easily found, because sleep itself is a profound mystery. The Lancet advises a careful examination of all habits in cases of sleeplessness, and is emphatic against the use of narcotics in any form unless prescribed by a physician.

A special from Washington to leading republican papers says that secretary of the treasury James G. Carlisle said yesterday: "If the democratic national convention declares for free coinage of silver at 16 to 1 I don't see what I can do but vote the republican ticket." It is further stated that he went on to say that as between a democratic 16 to 1 presidential ticket and a republican sound money ticket there was no other sound money ticket there was no other administration view of the financial question to do but to vote with the republicans.

Mr. Charles D. Walcott, director of the United States geological survey, will survey the gold, corundum, copper and mica deposits in North Carolina, including the most important part of the mineral regions of this state. A complete map of this region is to be made, and the work of this season will gather nearly all the data required. Special attention is being given to the economic features involved, and it is expected that a portion of the work done will be illustrated in the geological exhibits at the Atlanta exposition.

President Cleveland has a knack of stirring up the democrats. He is declared to be far from being in line with most of his party in the south on the silver question. He has recently written governor Stone of Mississippi a letter which is causing much stir. In the course of this letter he says: "Whether those appointed to places shall, in speech and act on, behave decently toward the administration under which they hold office must remain, to a large extent, a matter of taste and good breeding. There are, however, some officials who devote themselves so industriously to vilification and abuse of those under whom they hold office as to indicate that their fidelity cannot be trusted for the performance of their duties in a manner creditable to the administration, and who apparently assume they may spend the time they owe the public service in doing political mischief. In the interest of good government such office-holders must not be surprised if they are summarily dealt with."

**LATE NEWS NOTES.**  
 Items of Much Interest Briefly Collated.

It is reported that in consideration of Japan's abandonment of the Liao Tung peninsula in China, she will receive an additional indemnity of \$50,000,000.

There are no miners working in the Pocahontas coal mines. It is believed the union men have won the miners there and that the strikers have the field. The Hungarians have refused to work, and only a few men want to report for duty.

Oscar Wilde was released on bail at London yesterday after furnishing a personal bond for \$12,500 and two sureties in \$6,250 each. His sureties were Lord Douglas of Hawick and Rev. Stewart Headlam.

Dr. Peate of Butler, Pa., has cast the lens for the big telescope for the American university near Washington. It is the largest lens in the world, being sixty inches in diameter. The cast was perfect, and it is considered a great achievement.

Five thousand troops have started from Canton to China to crush the anticipated opposition of the "black flags" to the occupation of that island by the Japanese, according to the terms of the treaty of peace between China and Japan. Many of the troops are unreliable, and liable to join the "black flags."

Vice chancellor and ex-Gov. Robert S. Green, of New Jersey died yesterday in his sixty fifth year. He was a delegate to the democratic national convention of 1860, which nominated Stephen A. Douglas for the presidency.

Jake Kilrain of Baltimore was knocked out in the twenty-first round in his prize fight with Steve O'Donnell of Australia, before the Seaside club at Coney Island Monday evening. There were 6,000 people present.

Mr. J. S. Cohen entered on his duties as private secretary to secretary Hoke Smith yesterday. Mr. Cohen has been Washington correspondent of the Atlanta Journal.

Opinion is divided as to whether the proposed international monetary conference will be held or not. The case may rest with the kaiser of Germany. England holds a strong hand in the game.

Cholera has appeared with fatal effect at Camaran, an island in the Red Sea.

Miss Nellie Lambmond, 16 years old, was married in New York Monday to John Blauvelt, a man older than her father. The bride has been disowned by her parents and the present whereabouts of the couple is not known. Blauvelt is a widower 55 years old.

Charles A. Morgan, alias Morganfield, the noted Aquia creek train robber, was received at the penitentiary in Virginia yesterday, to serve eighteen years. He is still unable to walk, one of his legs having been broken when he jumped off the train at Cincinnati.
