The Happenings of a Day Told in Little Space.  
The agricultural building is decorated.  
Ex-judge Fred Phillips of Tarboro is here.

Badge vendors are as thick as blackberries in June.  
"What will the weather be?" was the universal inquiry today.  
Judge Avery finds that he will not be able to speak at the monument ceremonies.  
A meeting of the directors of the institution for the deaf, dumb and blind was held here today.  
Rev. Dr. and Mrs. J. L. M. Curry will fail from Italy on the 20th of May, and will reach New York June 1st.  
Remember the strawberry festival at Epworth chapel this afternoon. It will commence at 5 o'clock and last until 9.  
The marriage of Miss Mary E. Dorch of Goldsboro is announced from New York, where she has been for some time.  
Sheriff George K. Pritchard, of Mitchell county, who is a brother of senator Pritchard, brought four convicts to the penitentiary today.  
Mr. R. A. Lee of Charlotte is here. He is a member of the Queen City Guards and comes to complete arrangements for their stay in Raleigh.  
Miss Sarah Wilder, formerly of Raleigh now living in Birmingham, Ala., will arrive in Raleigh Sunday morning to visit her sister, Mrs. W. H. Rogers, on Oakwood avenue.

The Goldsboro Rifles 50 strong and the Queen City Guards of Charlotte 50 strong will arrive here tomorrow afternoon and will be met by the Governors' Guard and escorted to the latter's armory.

The July term of the superior court here begins on the 8th and not on the 15th, as many persons think. A number of magistrates have bound prisoners over until the 15th, thinking that was the date.

Mr. C. M. Busbee will speak to men in the parlor of the Y. M. C. A. Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Good music, led by the orchestra. Every man in the city cordially invited, especially strangers.

### The Little Events of a Day in the Capital City.

The supreme court building is decorated.  
Mrs. Stonewall Jackson arrived this afternoon.  
Jones' tobacco warehouse is the dining room of the veterans Monday. It is estimated that at least 800 soldiers will be in the parade Monday.  
The 135th report of supreme court decisions, for the September term, is out.  
Mr. W. C. McEakin says positively he will not take the position of street commissioner.  
On Dughl's special bill of fare Sunday and Monday will be Fresh Oysters and Deviled Crabs.  
Mr. C. R. Barker, commanding the well known Charles F. Fisher camp, C. V., of Salisbury, is here.  
Charles H. Perry is dropped from the roll of letter carriers and placed on the roll of substitute carriers.

The Southern railway people say they expect to bring 75 car loads of people here tomorrow and Monday.  
Over 400 visitors to the city arrived on the train from the west, due here at 1:10, but which did not arrive until 2:45.

Two faucets have been placed in the capitol square near the monument, to supply water for the thousands of people.  
Mr. C. I. Wallis, representing the widely known W. R. Irby cigar and tobacco company of New Orleans, was here today.

The speaker's platform in the capitol square is being decorated. It is covered with canvas. The decorations are in white and red.  
Dr. Peter E. Hines has been appointed by Col. T. S. Keenan, chief assistant and surgeon of the veteran corps for the 20th of May.

Mack Parks, a white man from Middle Creek township, was here today on his way to the roads, to serve out a sentence for assault.  
Bishop Cheshire will ordain Rev. Geo. D. Gilreath to the priest hood at Christ church tomorrow morning. Many of the clergy are expected to be present.

Mr. Herbert Brimley is now the curator of the state museum and fills that position excellently. The museum will be open all day Monday and will have thousands of visitors.  
State superintendent John C. Scarborough has nominated B. B. Brown of Buncombe to be manager of the normal department at the Calloway high school in Jackson county.

Miss Muldoon, daughter of Col. M. Muldoon of Louisville, Ky., arrived here today and is the guest of Mrs. Armistead Jones. Miss Daisy Smith of Goldsboro is also Mrs. Jones' guest.  
Prof. George D. Meares has composed an ode, "To our Confederate Dead," which is published, with the music, and is dedicated to Mrs. Armistead Jones, president of the ladies' monumental association. It will be sung at the confederate concert Monday evening at the academy of music.

The reports which come in about the cotton crop are all unfavorable. The plants look weak and sick. Six or seven days more of good weather will be necessary to complete the planting. Cotton seed ought all to be in the ground by May 10 at the least, and so they are in ordinary years. Farmers say they never know the planting to be as late as it is this season, never saw the seed germinate so slowly or saw so large a proportion of the crop to be replanted. It has been the wettest and coldest spring since that of 1867.

The Sunday and spring reunion of the First Baptist Sunday school of this city will occur tomorrow morning at 9:30, in connection with the regular session of the school. All former members of the school, members of the church and congregation and all non-members of any school, are cordially invited to be present and participate in the exercises on this occasion. Rev.
