A government paper dollar in  
 Argentina is now worth about 25  
 cents.

Joseph Jefferson the actor spoke at  
 Harvard last week and Sandow the  
 strong man at Yale.

In the Pennsylvania legislature a  
 bill to pay \$15,000 for the purchase of  
 "the William Penn Charter of Liberties  
 to the Province of Pennsylvania" passed  
 yesterday.

The U. S. treasury people made a  
 bad guess last December regarding  
 revenues and expenditures. However,  
 the gold fund is strong and their  
 mistake in estimates is not likely to  
 hurt anything.

More than \$97,000,000 of gold outside  
 of that held for the redemption of  
 outstanding certificates is in the U.  
 S. treasury, and the cash balance  
 aside from this amounts to about  
 \$85,000,000.

The anxiety concerning the overdue  
 French line steamer La Gascoigne at  
 New York was relieved yesterday  
 morning, when her signal for assistance  
 was desisted. Her piston was  
 broken when she was several days  
 out.

The London Truth has invited Richard  
 Croker and Michael F. Drawer, the  
 New Yorkers, to leave England  
 with their horses and condemned both  
 men severely for subordinating the  
 sport of racing to well-devised schemes  
 of gambling.

Secretary Carlisle's friends are more  
 confident than ever, since they have  
 seen the impression made in Kentucky  
 as well as the rest of the country,  
 by his Covington speech, that he  
 will be chosen to the senate to succeed  
 Mr. Blackburn.

Fifteen leather manufacturers of  
 Newark, N. J., representing the  
 largest owners of prepared leather in  
 the country, have notified dealers in  
 every section of the country of an  
 advance of from 50 to 100 per cent in  
 the price of leather.

"General Fever," the powerful ally  
 of the Hovas, appears to have begun  
 his ravages in the ranks of the French  
 troops in Madagascar. According to  
 report, in one company of French  
 soldiers, 180 strong, all but 40 men  
 are in hospital or dead.

Wheat prices yesterday advanced 3  
 to 3 1/2 cents per bushel, making a  
 rise of over 12 cents in a single week  
 and of over 22 cents from the low  
 point at which the grain went begging  
 for buyers a little over a month ago.  
 Adverse crop reports are the chief  
 basis of the big advance.

The exceptionally cool weather of  
 the past week has been very unfavorable  
 for most crops, and widespread injury  
 has been done by frosts, which  
 have been general throughout the  
 northern and central portions of the  
 country and as far south as the northern  
 portions of Georgia, Alabama and  
 Mississippi.

Secretary Herbert will deliver the  
 memorial day oration on the invitation  
 of John A. Logan post, G. A. R.,  
 at the government hospital for the insane  
 at Washington, D. C., where are  
 located the graves of many of the

union soldiers who died in hospitals  
 during the war and where over 100  
 confederates who were under the care  
 of union hospitals are buried. It is  
 expected that the president and his  
 cabinet will attend on the occasion.  
 The fact that secretary Herbert was a  
 confederate soldier is expected to  
 make the event of unusual importance.

Senator Palmer, of Illinois, called  
 on president Cleveland yesterday and  
 told him that Gov. Altgeld's silver  
 convention would carry out its  
 programme on the fifth of June and  
 declare for free coinage at 16 to 1, but  
 that the silver craze in Illinois was  
 already declining, and that before  
 next year it would largely disappear.

Japan sailed into an adversary ten  
 times her size and put through the  
 difficult and daring task in the handsomest  
 manner. At its conclusion she  
 finds Russia, Germany and France  
 banded together to hold her back.  
 The population of Japan is 39,000,  
 000; that of China, Russia, Germany  
 and France combined is \$603,000,000.  
 If Japan has been compelled to pause  
 she can point to the odds as the greatest  
 compliment in her history.

At the great parade of confederate  
 veterans at Houston, Texas, Wednesday  
 twenty-five companies of infantry  
 stepped off to strains of martial  
 music by the 5th cavalry United States  
 mounted band, and half a dozen  
 regimental bands. In the procession,  
 besides the state artillery companies,  
 were company F, 31 regiment, United  
 States regulars, three artillery and  
 three cavalry companies. The parade  
 was the largest military pageant seen  
 in Texas. There were 12,000 confederate  
 veterans in line. With them was  
 John H. Reagan, ex-postmaster general  
 of the confederacy, who was captured  
 with president Davis. A telegram  
 was received from Gen. Longstreet,  
 saying he would be unable to  
 attend the reunion.

**BREACH OF PROMISE CASE.**

Unique. As in This Instance a Man  
 Is the Plaintiff.

WESTMINSTER, Md., May 23.—A jury  
 sworn in a case in the circuit court  
 for Carroll county this afternoon that  
 promises to be one of the most interesting  
 in some respects in the history  
 of the court. It is a case of breach  
 of promise, and is unique because  
 probably for the first time in Maryland,  
 in any case of the character,  
 the plaintiff is the man and not the  
 woman.

D. Calvin Warner sues William H.  
 Powell and Mrs. Emma S. Powell, his  
 wife, and avers that previous to their  
 marriage he was engaged to be married  
 to Mrs. Powell. The contract to  
 marry Mr. Warner is not denied by  
 the defendants, but they claim that  
 after the engagement Mrs. Powell discovered  
 facts in relation to the plaintiff  
 that justified her refusal to consummate  
 the contract.

The plain is a widower, about 50  
 years of age. He is a justice of the  
 peace. Mrs. Powell is about 29  
 years of age and her husband about  
 the same. She inherited property  
 from her father valued at \$15,000.
