Italy has again been shaken by earthquake shocks which caused a panic. Thousands rushed into the streets and would not return to their homes. The shocks of two weeks ago cost many lives and did great damage.

King Oscar of Sweden has given a subscription for the construction of a balloon to be started to the north pole. If he has the privilege of naming the excursionists he has got hold of a good thing in the art of statesmanship.

Six months more will pass before congress meets. The house, the senate and the president are praying that the treasury deficits will end by that time. Each party wants to dodge tariff tinkering until after the presidential election.

Gov. Evans of South Carolina has found people inclined to laugh at his proclamations. It would be far more sensible, the St. Louis Globe Democrat says, if he would turn his attention to establishing a telephone connection with the governor of North Carolina.

"Bradstreet's" has found that at seventy-five points east of the Rocky mountains 227 factories started between April 1 and the end of May, giving work to 55,000 employes. Within this period, too, according to the same paper, the wages of 175,000 employes have been advanced an average of 10 per cent.

Frederick R. Couderc, of New York, an eminent lawyer, says if the fact becomes evident that the nations of Europe refuse relief by restoring silver coinage a storm will break and the result be financial revolution and loss to the United States, but ruin to Europe." He says further that European nations are beginning to find out that though they can get along without us we can get along without them.

Australia went slightly ahead of the United States in gold production last year. The figures respectively being \$41,000,000 and \$39,900,000. The yield of silver in the United States was 4,000,000 ounces less than in 1893. Colorado, Montana, Utah and Idaho turned out 91.2 per cent of the American silver and 40 per cent of the whole American yield of gold. The billion value of their silver was \$28,000,000.

Ecuador Rebels Winning. PANAMA, June 7.—Guayaquil, the capital of Ecuador, was captured yesterday by the revolutionary forces after three day's severe fighting. The government forces were driven back into the country. Losses on both sides were heavy.

OVER THE STATE.

Items of Much Interest Briefly Collated. The Goldsboro Rifles while engaged in taking up the bones of confederate soldiers buried near Bentonsville on the battle field where they fell, found many articles in a good state of preservation. The Argus says in one grave was a pocket book containing seven copper cents; in another a package of pins, needles and buttons, and a pair of shoes in very good shape.

The Roaring river section, says the Wilkesboro Chronicle, is again keeping up its reputation. A set of "white caps" have posted up notices giving notice that there must hereafter be no more information on moonshiners in that section otherwise there is to be somebody hurt. They also forbid anybody taking down the notices. Not even preachers are allowed to take one down.

John Dixon, the negro who murdered his cousin Lee Jones, at Wilmington, was outlawed yesterday, and \$100 reward was offered for his arrest. He was pursued Thursday by a posse of well armed men on a fast boat belonging to the monitor Nantuxet. Dixon was seen yesterday by a colored man near Hilton. A large posse of policemen, constables and armed citizens are now in pursuit of the murderer.

President Melver says that at the normal and industrial school at Greensboro an infirmary will be built for use in cases of contagious diseases. So strict are the health regulations now that pupils who have contagious diseases cannot be sent home. The new dining room to be built will be 60x100 feet and will seat 300. The best style of plumbing will be put in all the buildings. An addition to the main building, two stories in height, will give four new recitation rooms, each 30x50 feet. All these improvements will be finished by September 30. October 3 the school re-opens. The number of students at the last term was 405. Next term 455 will be taken.
