

### LATE NEWS NOTES.

#### Happenings Up-to-Date All Over the Country.

The duke of Cambridge, commander of the British forces, will resign command of the army October 1.

Gov. Atkinson, of Georgia, improves steadily and his recovery can almost be predicted with certainty.

Lightning struck a dynamite magazine near Kingwood, W. Va. Several men were killed and a great deal of property destroyed.

In the U. S. court at Charleston, S. C., yesterday Judge Simonson sentenced three dispensary constables to jail for two months for contempt of court for seizing liquors sent into the state for private use, and in defiance of the injunction granted by the court.

The jury in the case of Capt. Howgate, formerly of the army, brought in a verdict of guilty on each of the two indictments. One charged Howgate with forgery and the other with falsification of his official accounts. He may have to go to the penitentiary for twenty years.

Information reaching Washington indicates a combined movement in Cuba by all the Spanish forces. The new admiral, who has assumed command of the fleet, was chosen with a view to having his energy replace the more cautious policy of the old admiral. The arrival of ten more squadrons of Spanish cavalry is also regarded as a prelude to a decisive movement by the land forces.

There is trouble at Arrapahoe, Oklahoma, arising out of the shooting of an Indian, Red Lodge, by deputy sheriff Purch. Red Lodge cannot live and the Indians are making threats of vengeance to be carried out when he dies. On the day of the shooting the Indians were very much excited and threatening, and but were quieted by troop A, third cavalry. Old Red Lodge says if his son dies the Indian people will go on the warpath and wipe out the white people at Arrapahoe. When asked how many warriors the Cheyennes had he said from 300 to 400. He said they would get no help from the Arrapahoes, but would from the Kiowas.

#### A Strange and Deadly Combat.

DANVER, Col., June 21.—Ill feeling has prevailed for some time between the miners of the Rice, Aspen and Enterprise mines. Today the forces met underground by breaking away a wall that separated the claims. As the effect of the blast was seen the opposing forces rushed for the gap, and a desperate fight began with drills and shovels. Several heads were cracked, and the foreman called on their men to fall back to the protection of the rocks.

Then the duel commenced in earnest, the long-range weapons being giant powder cartridges. With these the men fought like demons for an hour, launching dynamite at each other whenever a head or an arm was seen projecting beyond the rocks. Two men were seriously wounded, one of them having his shoulder torn off, and the other is said to be suffering from blindness, caused by the explosion of a mine at close quarters. By this time the noise of the conflict reached the surface, where the superintendents were in their offices, unaware of the intense excitement in the subterranean chamber. They hastily armed guards and went to the level where the men were ambushed, and, by a display of arms, compelled a cessation of hostilities.

Work was suspended until there is an underground survey, so as to determine the ownership of the disputed territory.

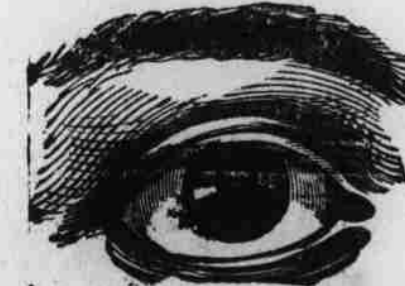
