THE WEATHER.

The Conditions and the Forecast.

For North Carolina: Generally fair tonight and Saturday; warmer Saturday.

Local forecast for Raleigh and vicinity: Saturday, occasional showers; warmer.

Local data for 24 hours ending 8 a. m.: Maximum temperature, 80; minimum temperature, 65; rainfall 0.00.

The conditions are very unsettled this morning. The pressure is relatively high over northern New England and over the South Atlantic States. Between these two areas of high pressure there is an area of low pressure. It is raining at Norfolk and Philadelphia. Heavy rain occurred at Hatteras yesterday and last night. The pressure falls to the westward, the wind being found over Dodge City and Huron. There is a depression over northern Florida which may cause considerable rain. It is raining at Savannah. The temperature is somewhat higher in the northwest.

July Weather Here.

Mr. VonHermann gives the following facts regarding the weather here in July: The mean temperature was 77 degrees; the highest 100, on the 30th; the lowest 52, on the 18th. The greatest daily range was 31 degrees, on the 3rd. The mean temperature for June during the past nine years is 76. The highest wind velocity was 28 miles an hour, from the north. The total rainfall was 3.79 inches. It was a dry June, liked by the farmers, for the average June rainfall here is 4.64 inches. The accumulated excess of daily mean temperature in June was 55 degrees. The accumulated deficiency of daily mean temperature since January 1st, is 413 degrees; average daily deficiency, 2.3 degrees. This is quite remarkable.

It has been alleged by some that the nature of the freight traffic agreement between the Seaboard Air Line and the Atlantic Coast Line is so rigid that the latter cannot break away and join forces with the Southern. Yet it is stated by a high official that it is not a strong agreement, but can be shaken at any time.

The picnic of the Sunday school of the Fayetteville street Baptist church was held yesterday in Wilder's grove, on the Milburnie road. The independent band made delightful music. Everybody had a good time, and kind-hearted Mr. John T. Pullen was master of ceremonies.

PICKED UP IN RALEIGH AND VICINITY.

The Happenings of a Day Told in Little Space.

Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Massey are in Maryland for the summer.

Mr. W. C. Stronach went to Cleveland Springs today.

The Raleigh hosiery yarn mills declare a six per cent. dividend.

The Raleigh national bank declares a 4 per cent. semi-annual dividend.

The brick pavement on the south side of the park hotel is finished.

Mr. Joseph Crayton has two very sick children at his home on South Salisbury street.

Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Maynard have returned from their wedding tour.

Senator Marion Butler last evening addressed the populist state convention of Kentucky at Louisville.

The Raleigh hosiery yarn mills put in 6500 more spindles, making the total number about 14,000.

The guard house was not occupied by any business yesterday or last night. There were no fights or drunkenness on the 4th.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Raleigh cemetery association will be held at the Citizens' bank on Tuesday 9th inst. at 6 o'clock p. m.

Senator Ransom is now at the Greenbrier White Sulphur springs, Va., and will be at Washington, D. C., in a few days.

Mr. Walter Woolcott and family and Misses Gertie Thiem and Laura Young left this morning for Copal Grove.

The railroad commission increases the assessment of two or three of the railroads. The general increase will not, however, be large.

Mr. James I. Thomason of Wilson arrived here yesterday to secure tents for the use of the Wilson Light Infantry, which goes into camp at Morehead City July 10, for ten days.

None of the building and loan associations from other states are now lending money on property in this state. The shut down is complete. The local associations are making loans.

The cotton receipts here this season are 31,422 bales against 28,816 last season. The week's receipts are 28 bales and the shipments the same. There are only 20 bales on the platform. Middling cotton is 71-8.

Yesterday was a great day among the colored people at Concord, who celebrated the fourth by laying the cornerstone of Price memorial church in memory of Rev. John C. Price, the ablest negro ever known in this State. Rev. M. A. Smith delivered the principal address. C. G. Montgomery, Esq., made a short speech.

Yesterday there were special services in honor of the fourth of July at the church of the Good Shepherd, conducted by Rev. Dr. I. McK. Pittenger, and were well attended. Dr. Pittenger made very appropriate remarks, saying that the church and state ought to observe the national holiday. The music was excellent. Mr. Piggott of Atlanta sang a patriotic hymn.

The state treasurer has received from the government, from the fund under the Morrill act, \$21,000 for the two agricultural and mechanical colleges. Of this 64 per cent. goes to the one for the whites at this city, and 36 per cent. to the one for negroes at Greensboro.

The agricultural department has laid before the state treasurer an inquiry as to whether some funds on hand are available for paying for holding farmers' institutes. The new commissioner is particularly anxious to hold as many of these institutes as possible this season. He knows that is the best way to bring the department close to the farmers. But it is not believed that the commissioner will be able to hold any institutes this year, as it is thought the money it was hoped would be available cannot be used.

Mr. Greek O. Andrews of the Baltimore Herald is here.

Mrs. F. A. Olds and son Douglas left this morning for Southport on a visit, and thence go to Wrightsville.

A man named Gaston Jones in this county is the owner of a sow which has raised thirty pigs in ten months.

Next week work begins on the new dormitory at the A. & M. college. Twelve students will work on it.

Sheriff Call of Wilkes brought a convict to the penitentiary today. The convict had escaped some months ago.

About 320 persons left here on the "Triple Link" excursion. They returned this afternoon at 4 o'clock after a pleasant trip. Some money was made.

Last evening a state officer who is very well known in Charlotte gave a street beggar \$1 and told him to get it changed. The money and boy both disappeared.

There have been many people at Alford's pond this week. The water was so muddy that no fish were caught. Register of deeds Rogers thoughtfully took out some sardines.

The Christian Sunday school thanks Messrs. Eberhardt & Baker and Kirkland for their kindness in giving ice for use at the picnic.

The revenue collections in this district for the year ending June 30 were \$1,054,708 60, against \$928,000 the previous year.

The eighth annual picnic and excursion to Littleton of the Raleigh & Gaston relief association will be given July 20.

Today Mrs. F. H. Busbee and Weldon N. Smith, Esq., left for Scotland Neck, where Mr. Smith's father is sick, having a stroke of facial paralysis.

During an electrical storm at Burlington yesterday afternoon a large barn belonging to one of the Holts was struck by lightning and totally destroyed in a few minutes.

The Wilmington Star says it looks like old times to see William Moncure, T. W. Whitsnott and Frank Williams holding responsible positions on the Seaboard Air Line, and it congratulates these gentlemen.

Deputy revenue collectors W. F. Gibson and Spence Taylor seized a 100 gallon illicit distillery in the middle of a swamp in Columbus county. For years it had been operated.

Gen. M. C. Butler, ex-U. S. senator from South Carolina, is here, having some private business with Maj James W. Wilson. He was last in Raleigh in January, 1895. He called on Gov. Carr and Maj Jack Hayes, U. S. A.

Last evening Mr. Fenner Eatman and Miss Florence Shaw of this county made their appearance at the home of Rev. D. H. Tuttle and asked him to unite them in marriage. He quickly performed the ceremony.

The Seaboard Air Line system has now begun the operation of the Columbia, Newberry and Laurens railroad, and is entering Columbia once more. This is done under the queer lease whereby this road is operated one year by the Atlantic Coast Line system and the next year by the Seaboard system.

Mr. Jack Williams, so long in the express services here and now a resident of Wilmington, is to be congratulated upon the high stand his son took at the Stevens institute at Hoboken, where he took a 5-year course and graduated with honor. Mr. and Mrs. Williams attended the commencement.

REX HOSPITAL.

The Board of Aldermen Meets This Evening.

This evening the board of aldermen will discuss some questions. One of these is the withdrawal of the \$2,000 annual appropriation to the Rex hospital. An alderman said today: "We are greatly annoyed by reason of the trouble the city now has in securing the admission of patients into the hospital. There is entirely too much red tape. Our patients are not now admitted save upon approval of all the medical staff. The other day a tramp who was sick of pneumonia was forced to lie in the station house from 7 a. m. one day to 2 p. m. the next day, all because of this red tape matter. If not remedied we will withdraw the appropriation."

Between parts first and second there will be some ballroom excursions for the benefit of the children present. No doubt there will be a large attendance if the weather is favorable.

A Strange Runaway.

Yesterday afternoon Dr. James McGee's horse broke away from a hitching post on South Harrington street and dashed into the side of the depot car shed, breaking down two gates. The horse dashed along the train shed and was stopped at the east end of the latter. One wheel of the buggy was sprung. That was all the damage.

The Condition of the Crop.

Wheat this year is 88 per cent. against only 65 at this time last year. Oats, now 84, were last year only 68. Rye is 87, against 78. Rice, now 82, was 100 last year. Cotton is 69, against 74 last year. The July report will make, perhaps, a better showing as to this crop. Corn is 84, against 86 last year at this date. The plant is very small, but there is time enough, under favorable conditions, for a full crop. The apple crop is not much over half a one, but the peach crop is certainly a fine one.

A Statement.

During the absence of the editor, a few days ago, a publication was made in the Visitor regarding the street railway which has caused no little comment and criticism. The article in question was one which the editor does not endorse and for which of course he bears no responsibility. The Visitor desires above all things to be just and hence this statement, which is but plain justice to manager Keeler, who has done so much to develop the street railway, and who has been well aided by his employees. The Visitor has nothing to do with personal quarrels or dislikes, but proposes to treat corporations and individuals with justice and equal courtesy.

REMNANTS.

Today, as was stated in the Visitor, the Raleigh News and Observer began to take the associated press dispatches, and a lively little war, it seems, is to be the result. The united press claims it has a three years' contract with the paper. The associated press has put its wire in the News and Observer office and the united press wire is removed, but its dispatches will be sent from the western union office. There will probably be a suit by the united press. The associated press seems to be gaining ground rapidly. The News and Observer is bound to have the news.

The state auditor now takes charge of the issue of warrants for direct taxes, under the provisions of the new act. Up to this time the governor has issued these, the total number issued being 17,295.
