Happenings Up-to-Date All Over the Country.

Minnesota and Dakota farmers are gloomy. A week age wheat promised the greatest yield ever known in that section, but it has rained four days the last week. It is feared that the erop of wheat is entirely spoiled.

Patrick Callahan, a bartender, jumped from the Brooklyn bridge yesterday He was picked up by a row boat and arrested. Callahan was bleeding from the mouth and complained of great pain in the back. The jump was made for a purse of \$1,700.

In view of the report that Ecuador is threatening to invade Columbia, the garrison of Pananma is being rein forced. It is added that the United States consul has telegraphed to Washington asking that a United States warship be sent to protect American interests.

A Zanesville, Ohio, at a camp meet ing at the auditorium in a grove trees three feet in diameter were uprocted by a cyclone or twisted off. One was blown on the auditorium, crushing the building. Mrs Wilson was struck on the head and was killed. George Deslin was caught under the tree and died about an hour after being taken out. A dozen others were badly burt.

Yesterday afternoon the revenue cutter McLane, fired upon and captured the tug George W. Childs, which is said to have been purchased by the Cubans for fillbustering purposes. Signals were set for the Childs to stop but no attention was paid to them, and seeing no chance of overtaking her two solid shot and a shell were fired before she stopped. She was boarded by a crew from the cutter and taken to Key West.

Cut this Out and Preserve It.

The following from the National Tribune is the clearest statement we have yet seen as to what is meant by the free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1.

It means simply that one grain, or one ounce, or one pound-any quantity you please-of gold shall be considered as worth 16 grains, onnces or pounds of silver. This is a convenient statement of the ratio adopted for United States mints by the coinage act of 1834. It is eractly 15 98. That is 100 ounces of gold were held to be worth 1,598 ounces of silver. The ratio was then expressed by providing that the silver dollar should contain 371 1-4 grains of pure silver (412 1 2 have 23.22 grains of pure gold (25.8 grains 9-10 fine.) The free silver advocates want every holder of silver to be allowed to take it to the mint and have every 371 1-4 grains of it madinto a silver dollar which shall be as good as a gold dollar. The objection to this is, that much silver is worth in the markets of the world only about 47 cents.
