There are about forty thousand square miles in Cuba, and a correspondent at Santiago states that the flag of free Cuba is hoisted over thirteen districts, covering eighteen thousand square miles, or nearly half the island.

Statistics show that the average annual loss of life by lightning in the United States is 224 persons, and this out of a population of nearly seventy millions. This means that about one person out of every 312,000 is killed every year in the United States.

Though Vermont has increased in population but two thousand in twenty-five years, Massachusetts has added nearly one million to its inhabitants in the same time, and Rhode Island and Connecticut also show a steady growth.

Some alleged genius in the wild west claims to have discovered that grasshoppers can be made into butter. This recalls the text of the old hardshell preacher, "Man groweth up like a peppergrass and hoppeth around like a hoppergrass."

The square or main part of the Grant tomb on the Hudson river in Riverside park, New York, has been finished and the memorial will stand complete in another year. It is said that not another city in this country would have lost so much time in erecting the monument.

A scheme of great magnitude looking to the colonization of five thousand families, or about thirty thousand people, from Iowa, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Nebraska and other western states to settle in Georgia is about consummated, and sometime in September the movement will be begun to their new homes.

JACKSON'S Hole in Wyoming which the Indians have now left is one of the best hunting grounds in the U. S. It is a narrow valley, lying just south of and bordering on the Yellowstone national park. At its lowest point the valley is six hundred feet above the sea.

COL. WABING, the new street commissioner of New York city, says the sewage and other waste there if handled by the best method would pay a profit of \$7,000,000 a year, or enough to meet the cost of cleaning, paving and sprinkling the streets. The waste of the city is now bringing in but \$150,000.

CALIFORNIA has been taking the lead lately in great engineering enterprises. Mention has been made of the great electric plants at Sacramento and Folsom, and nearly forty thousand acres of the best agricultural land will soon be irrigated from the big "flume" connected with a dam and tunnels. The flume will have a capacity of 476,000,000 gallons a day, and will give more than sixty square miles of farms the benefit of permanent irrigation.

A RIOT proclamation has been issued by the mayor of Omaha on account of the police commissioners' row there which has reached a critical stage. The chief of police guards the doors of the fire and police alarm operators. A telegram from Chicago offers to furnish five thousand armed Americans to put down law breakers in Omaha.

It is said on authority that if ex-secretary William C. Whitney shall change his mind and wish to be considered an aspirant for next year's democratic nomination for the presidency he will have the support of president Cleveland.

The Confederate veterans of Virginia are taking a deep interest in the great reunion to be held at Richmond next May, at the laying of the corner-stone of the Jefferson Davis monument. New camps are being formed throughout the state, the old ones are adding new members at every meeting, and old soldiers are making preparations to visit the capital of the late Confederacy next May.
