FORTIFICATIONS WERE DESTROYED

The Texas, Marblehead and Suwanee Shelled the Batteries at Caimanera.

ADMIRAL DEWEY WILL RESIST INTERVENTION.

Authorities Assert That Any Attempt of Any Nation Will be Resisted—Santiago Shelled by the New Orleans.

FORTIFICATIONS DESTROYED.

Camp McCalla, Guantanamo, Wednesday afternoon, June 15.—The brick fort and earthworks at Caimanera, near the end of the railroad leading to Guantanamo, were demolished by the Texas, Marblehead and auxiliary cruiser Suwanee today. The bombardment opened at two o'clock and lasted one hour. The Texas went slowly up the channel leading to the fortifications followed closely by the Marblehead. About one dozen shots were fired and the earthworks were destroyed. The Spaniards escaped in the bushes by St. Paul. Spaniards fired only five shots doing no damage. The Suwanee shelled the bushes, driving the Spaniards inland.

This morning at 10 o'clock in the Mayor's court J. M. Bishop, who runs a bicycle repair shop, on Fayetteville street, Arthur Starling and another 10 year old boy named Rufus Mitchell were arraigned charged with cruelty to animals. The case came up in Mayor's court on the day previous and was postponed by request of counsel for defense, Mr. W. L. King. This morning upon sworn affidavit of J. M. Bishop that he did not believe he could get justice before Mayor King, the case was removed to the court of Justice of the peace J. C. Mansford. The witnesses for the state were unable to establish a case and Justice Mansford dismissed the case and discharged defendant.

There was no evidence to prove that the offense had been committed though it had been acknowledged out of court on the plea of driving away a nuisance. All the parties to the affair deeply regret its occurrence.
