The absence of counsel when their cases are called has been a chronic evil in the criminal courts particularly. Not infrequently are cases continued from term to term because of absence of counsel, but Judge Brown put a stop to such while he will preside in this district by his order that all cases will be tried at the hour and on the day set and lawyers must govern themselves accordingly. The effect of such an order must be altogether salutary, conserving as it will the interests of judicial procedure while involving no hardships of which any member of the bar can rightfully complain.

The New York Herald thinks that first of all in the reorganization of the army must come the removal of Secretary Alger. "He clogged the army with a flood of raw and inexperienced civilians who were the relatives or proteges of somebodys politically powerful, and instead of advancing experienced soldiers out of the ranks and file of the regulars to care for the safety and health of the levies he made his great opportunity serve as a fulcrum for his political aspirations. Neither a menace to our liberties nor a pitiful example of organized force whose valor and efficiency lack the saving grace of a true discipline."

The Samoan situation leads the Brooklyn Eagle to conclude that "the evidence of co-operation between the two great English speaking nations is too clear for Germany to be unable to understand it. She is not deliberately challenging chastisement at our hands. A warship at Apia will restore order and remind the exultant German consul that one is not a majority of three."

The principal duty of a legislature is to make and unmake laws and persons elected as legislators should be chosen with regard to their qualifications."

The Senatorial fight at Harrisburg, as far as it has gone is a mere perfunctory affair. "It is obvious that Quay cannot be elected by Republican votes, and the Democrats must decide on one of two policies. They must either determine to cast their votes solidly for a Republican of such character and ability as to be acceptable to the independent Republicans, and thus give them an opportunity to vindicate themselves by his election, or, by continuing to cast a solid Democratic vote for the Democratic candidate, they must eventually force the retirement of Quay, who would select a compromise candidate satisfactory to himself."
