### Senate Defeated Bill Giving University \$10,000 for Sewerage.

Directors of A. & M. College Elected-Two Railway Commissioners Chosen -- Changes in Congressional Districts---Members of the New Agricultural Board Chosen.

The Senate met at 9:30, and prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Bain. Among the bills which passed final

reading were: To provide for election of commissioners of Johnson county, to appoint 3 commissioners to represent North Carolina at the Paris Exposition in 1900; to authorize school dispricts to pay for listing school taxes; to permit the citizens of Morganton to vote for a dispensary; to provide for the support and maintenance of the State Guard: to incorporate the Raleigh Warehouse Co: to provide for a cotton seed weigher at Franklinton; to incorporate the Black Diamond Railway Company: to repeal chapter 157. laws of 1895, regarding justices of the peace; to incorporate the Roxboro cotton mill; to incorporate the Wilson Savings Bank; to incorporate the Salisbury Savings Bank; to permit judgment by default at Durham criminal court; to provide for short form of agricultural lien in Johnston, Iredell and Columbus counties; relative to the board of agriculture and removing the power of erecting a building; to change the courts of Lenoir county; to appoint additional magistrates for Lenotr county; to incorporate the rown of Forestville; to provide for a dispensary for Bethel, with amendment that it be submitted to a vote of the people; to amend the charter of Burlington; to allow Orange county to levy tax to pay floating debt; to incorporate Bellhaven, Beaufort county; to incorporate the order of Druids in Wilmington; to incorporate the United Benefit Association of Wilmington; to amend the charter of Apex; to incorporate the Pungo and Matamuskes't Railway Co.; to incorporate the Asheville Savings Bank; to Incorporate Saratoga in Wilson; to incorporate Alexia in Gaston; to provide for highways through public roads in Durham; to increase the number of commissioners of Lincoln county; to incorporate the Merchants' and Farmers' Bank in Durfram.

Senator Justice offered an amendment that the annual appropriation of the University be reduced to \$20,000 for the next 'two years.

Senator Duniels thought that the appropriations of the University should be kept on a level with those of 1897.

Sentator Osborne believed the appropriation a necessity Senatur Wilson for the committee org-ed the appropriation. Brown withdrew his amendment.

The vote was taken upon Justice's amendment, which provides that the \$10,000 be given, but that the amual appropriation be decreased to \$20,000 for the next two years. This amendment

was carried by a vote of 23 to 21.

A scene of confusion followed and Justice finally consented to allow the whole bill to be withdrawn.
