"THE HOME OF WESLEY." Rev. J. O. Knott Describes a Recent

Visit to Lincolnshire, England, Rev. J. O. Knot, paster of Emmanuel Methodist Episcopal Church South, of this city, returned on Saturday from a visit to Europe and occupied his pulpit yesterday morning and evening. Havleys, and also Oxford and London, which are closely associated with the Methodsit movement, he spoke last evening upon a "Visit to the Birthplace and Grave of John Wesley." Among other things he said:

"John Wesley was the personification of Methodism. He was a child of Providence, as was Methodism. Both his father and mother were children at Nonconformists, and both became members of the Established Church despite early training. Their sons, John and Charles, howover, had Nonconformist blood in their veins, and became the most aggressive and independent preachers of their day.

"In what is called the Isle of Ax-bolme, in northern Lincolnshire, is still to be seen the quaint village of Ep-worth, five miles from a railroad, and no larger now than it was 100 years ago. It numbers about 2,000 souls, At the east of the town on a hill are to be seen the Epworth rectory and Epworth Church, still in the hands of the Church of England, the 'living' being worth now about \$3,000. The rectory is the one in which the Wesley boys were reared, and the church, though changed some within, remains much as it was when Samuel Wesley ministered there and Susanna, with her 19 children,

joined in the service.
"The rectory is the scene of Wesley's rescue from the flames, and stands to-day a different house from the one he was born in because of the fire rhich so nearly proved his destruction. Here he was rescued when a boy 6 years old. The rectory was the scene of that wonderful system of training which the Wesley children passed through, their mother unconsciously training both the founder and the hymn writer of the great Methodist Church. while she did the best she could to make £200 a year suffice to supply her unusually large family.

"At London one may my the house i which Wesley passed the closing days of his life. It adjoins the church he built-City Road Chapel. The room in which he died is connected with a all apartment where Wesley spent an bour in prayer each morning. City Road churchyard, with Dr. Clarke, the commentator, at his side and Dr. Watson, the theologian, at his head, the yellow monument of John Wesley stands. Just across the street is the Bun Hill Fields burial grounds, in which Susanna Westey, the mother of Methodism, is buried."-Baltimore
