THE LEADER IN THE NEWS AND
IN CITY CIRCULATION.

The postmaster of a small town in Eastern Massachusetts resigned the other day, and before nightfall six candidates were actively in the field competing for the appointment to succeed him.

Chicago juries are continuing to give verdicts for large amounts to persons injured by street cars. A boy who had both legs cut off by a trolley has just been awarded \$21,000, and a woman who was thrown in the street by the starting of the car while she was attempting to alight has received a verdict for \$12,500. She had sued for \$10,000.

Dr. Calvin S. Ellis, who died in 1883, left \$50,000 to pay the tuition and room rent of any of his descendants who might elect to go to Harvard. The legality of this bequest has just been established after a 16 year contest. Meanwhile several of Dr. Ellis' descendants have been graduated from Harvard, and there are now none left to profit by the will.

A writer in Forest and Stream says that the criminal tendency is manifested to a greater or less extent by all the lower animals, and he has compiled a list of 18 crimes which are commonly committed by birds, beasts and reptiles. The indictment includes murder, perjury, marriage, suicide, theft, kidnapping, highway robbery, polygamy and drunk driving.

The following curious bit of English appeared the other day in the Standard of Inquirer and Mirror: "Stimman C. Cash caught a look in his finger Sunday, while exhibiting of 'Stimmon'. He was unable to extricate it, and had to take his mother and row ashore with it pending the flesh all the time. Dr. R. E. Pitman removed it."

The 15-year-old son of Commandant Crozier of the Transval army fights at his father's side. The only son of Myaher Wolmarans, and two sons of State Secretary Ritz; Judge Kook, Ex-Judge Essen, and several sons of members of the Cape Parliament, are fighting on the Boer side. One prominent colonist at Paarl has 57 relatives with the Republican forces.

The City Council of Atlanta, Ga., recently passed an ordinance making it unlawful to bet on horse or other races in that city, and Mayor Woodward vetoed it. He said that the ordinance as constructed was flatly to be used maliciously, and incidentally he referred to the evils of bucket shops and said that the injury accomplished by the betting on horse racing amounts to practically nothing when compared to the legalized and respectable form of gambling known as dealing in futures.

In Boston the other day a man who had been arrested on a charge of non support was fined \$20, and his neglected wife secured his release by paying that amount. Under the provision of the law relative to such cases which provides for the payment of the amount of the husband's fine to the wife, however, the sum was promptly refunded to the woman, and the pair left the court rejoicing.

The Philippine Commissioners, it is now given out, will make a preliminary report upon their observations of the condition of affairs in the East Indian archipelago. This report will be too late for any effect upon the elections next Tuesday, but it will be of great advantage as a basis for intelligent discussion and suitable Congressional action. The Commissioners have been on the ground, and have had such opportunity of observation as will give their report and recommendations great weight.

The islands of the Philippine archipelago are spread out like a fringe in front of the greatest market for cotton cloths in the world. The inhabitants of tropical Asia are wearers of cotton fabrics, and they far outnumber the cotton users of all other countries. The possession of the Philippines is a wedge of great commercial importance in holding the door open for our trade with Japan, Korea, China, Siam and the European Asiatic colonies. This aspect of the question of expansion is worthy of serious consideration, especially in the cotton-growing States.

William R. Moody, a son of D. L. Moody, has resigned the editorship of the Record of Christian Work, and will assume the editorial management of the Northfield Echoes, which will hereafter appear every month, and be the regular organ for the work of Northfield, Chicago and the Northfield Extension improvements.
