Mr. Editor: In your issue of the 9th under the caption "Prosperity Indica-tors," you fall into the error of placing South Carolina a little behind or just up with North Carolina in the matter of cotton spindles. The annual report of the Financial Chronicle for the year ending September 1st, 1800, gives the statistics following regarding conton

mills in these tow States; Number of mills in North Carolina 108; in South Carolina, 75; spindles in North Carolina, 1.003/268; in South Carolina, 1.285,328; looms in North Carolina, 22,178; in South Carolina, 35,277; cotton manufactured in North Carolina, 380,234 bales or 175,020,580 pounds; in South Carolina, 438,867 bales or 204,970,126 pounds; carton produced in North Carolina, 180,000 bales, in South Chrolina, 960,000 hales. According to these figures, S outh Caro lina had somewhat less than half as many mills as North Carolina, but over a quarter of a million more spindles, and over thereen thousand noore loons and consumed nearly twenty-live milbon pounds (58,623 hales) more cotton than her sister State, But whereas South Carolina manufactured only about 46 per cent, of the cotton she produced. North Carolina manufactured about 79

It is of no great consequence which is in the lead; the important fact is that they are both doing wonderfully well. And whatever else the Governor of South Carolina may remark to the Governor of North Carolina, he cannot say, "It is a long time, or a long way, between ----- spindles." J. M. PICKEL, 3
