THE LEADER IN THE NEWS AND  
IN CITY CIRCULATION.

The Dickey Bird has made his appearance in Newbern.

For once The Citizen, in our humble opinion, is correct.

The death of General A. D. Cowles, ex-State Adjutant General, at Statesville is sincerely deplored. He was a genial, clever man and in his death we feel the loss of a personal friend. He was always kind and thoughtful of others, and North Carolina never had a more assiduous official. We extend deepest sympathy to the bereaved ones.

The object of the journey to the Sandwich Islands, for which Bishop Foster has embarked, has failed out. He intends to interview the Rt. Rev. Dr. Alfred Lewis, the Anglican Bishop there, on the subject of transferring the diocese to the American House of Bishops. The diocese of Honolulu is an independent one, but it has a nominal connection with the Church of England, and therefore Dr. Lewis was placed at its head. The American House of Bishops is willing to accept the diocese, but they are not disposed to accept Dr. Lewis with him as his work there has been attended with but little success.

A bill prohibiting the sale of liquor in the State of Georgia has strong support before the Legislature now in session in Atlanta. The Atlanta Journal strongly opposes the passage of the bill because 117 of the 127 counties of the State are now "dry" and the Journal claims that it is only to attempt to force prohibition on the twenty "wet" counties over the protest of a majority of the voters in those twenty counties. When the people want prohibition they can vote liquor out as was done in the 117 "dry" counties. A law not backed by public sentiment, the Journal claims, is generally a dead letter.

It is a matter of fact that Mr. Goodell can not become governor of Kentucky unless 1,200 votes cast for Taylor in Nelson county and 1,000 votes cast for him in Knox county are thrown out. The 1,200 ballots actually cast in Nelson county contained Taylor's name correctly. Those 1,200 votes, cast there, were for W. S. Taylor; but there was an error in the printed certificates, which name the others of election certificates erroneously that the votes were cast for W. P. Taylor. The error was in the printed certificates of the officers of the election, but the ballots cast were all right. In Knox county the paper on which the ballots were printed were not quite as thick as the Goodell men thought they ought to be and on this pretext they would throw out these 1,400 votes. Without throwing out these 2,600 votes it is impossible for Goodell to be elected. There may be Democrats in Kentucky so lost to all sense of honor as to endorse this sort of thing, but we hardly think that any Democrat outside of the State, familiar with the facts, would do so. The installation of Mr. Goodell as governor of the Democratic party, if he is honestly elected on the face of the returns, he should be installed, no matter what the consequences; if he is defeated on the face of the returns he should be made to acquiesce in the result and give Kentucky a long rest from himself.—Memphis Commercial Appeal.

The Commercial Appeal can rest easy. The Board of Elections has acted fairly and counted the votes for W. S. Taylor.

### SCRIPTURES AND EGG TRUST.

### THE YEAR'S ASTROLOGY.

American, French and English Wars Fairly Forecast a Twelve-Month Since.

The astronomers are taking some credit to themselves, not without reason, for their good shots concerning this troubled year. Thus, in the number of "Modern Astrology," dated January, 1889, Alan Leo, its editor, was able to warn us of a year of war. France, he said, would "attract the eyes of the world," and so she certainly did. If this is a little too vague for the Dreyfus affair, what follows is only a year of Fashoda. "We are likely to be involved by French action, but war may be averted; still, a warlike spirit will be aroused; the public mind will be excited, and war will be the topic of conversation throughout the world of Great Britain." Well, astrologers have often done worse. This too, for America presumably the United States—is scarcely a twelve-month short. "Many troubles are in store for this country, and her enemies will cause her anxiety." It would have been better still to say that those enemies would not be free from anxiety on their own account. But all this is nothing to what follows: "We have no hesitation in now saying that the climax of 1890 will be a great war. Africa as ruled by this sign (Mars) will be the cause of great bloodshed and a great disturbance of the universal peace." A hit! a hit! a very palpable hit! So far so good for "Modern Astrology." But the firm has done better still. For the end of September, 1889, Old Moore predicted this:

"Great excitement will be caused throughout the land by news contained in a telegram to the press of a splendid victory by our troops abroad. As usual, alas! the number of officers picked off seem to be far in advance of the average. Our rank and file will suffer great loss. The joy caused by the victory will be overshadowed. A beloved life will be awaited with restless interest." This is quite near enough as to the date, considering how very near it is to the fact of General Synnott and the battle of Dundee.

After this, we can hardly refuse our respectful attentions to "Modern Astrology's" planetary calendar, for each month as it passes. This has obvious advantages, as it tends to fix our attention on a particular period, instead of dispersing it over a whole year. Thus, it cannot but be of precious use to learn that certain specified days of November are good for obtaining a favorable hearing from superiors, and certain others for literary undertakings, correspondence and publishing. Nay, there are, even "good days to consult a doctor," and they not inaptly coincide with the days for "deeds of bravery and courage." A whole batch of "favorable days" are pointed out for other "dates." "Pleasant courtships, marriage, etc., may be expected with reason on the days of the month. Financial affairs succeed and domestic arrangements go smoothly." "Sweet days, so called, so bright! Few male servants engaged to advantage."
