General Wheeler believes it to be the duty of Congress to dispel without delay Aguinaldo's delusion that it is not the purpose of this country to suppress insurrection in the Philippines. General Wheeler is right. It will be better for his country and also for the Filipinos.

Syracuse, N. Y., has established a municipal lodging house at which an applicant is furnished with a supper, bath, lodging and breakfast on condition that he works at street cleaning half a day. A meal is furnished for one hour's work. The system has put an end to the tramp nuisance.

In Norton county, Kansas, there was a tie between the candidates for Register of Deeds. It was agreed in the Board of County Commissioners, says The Kansas City Journal, that a silver dollar be passed to settle it, and the dollar was pitched in the air by the Populist member. It came head, and the Republican won.

Count Skorzewski, a wealthy land owner in Posen, Germany, has recently caused a sensation among the natives by employing a maid instead of horses or oxen to draw the plow on his estate. The experiment has proved successful, and it is probable that it will be followed in other agricultural districts.

One of the results of the late war with Spain will be the change in the furniture of our war vessels. Formerly all the furniture, which was made of wood, had to be thrown overboard just before battle in order to lessen the chances of fire. Metal furniture will take the place of the wooden, and the cruiser Atlanta is the first vessel to be equipped with it. The furniture, consisting of chairs, tables, sofas, beds, etc., is made of chilled steel tubing and light wire-work.

A London weekly offered a prize of fifty guineas for the best telegram of encouragement to the British soldiers in the Transvaal. It was won by Colonel Francis Cornwallis, whose answer reads as follows: "Soldiers, your grateful country men and women recognize the courage and discipline which have added fresh pages to our glorious annals."

The Free Press fails to see that the present management of the A. & N. C. railroad pursued good business policy in borrowing \$50,000 to make improvements. The road has been and should continue in a larger degree to be more than self-sustaining for quite a number of years. We believe that it was rather poor policy announcing that no dividends will be paid, poor policy in determining not to pay at least a small dividend. We shall try to keep up with the situation, and at this early stage give our opinion as above. However, we have not the slightest prejudice against, but are predisposed to favor the present administration, and if later results prove its policy to be wise, we shall be glad to say so. -Kinston Free Press.

TO PUT IT IN THE DEED.

Mrs. Smith Wants No Transfer of the Sidley Home.

Mrs. Charlotte Smith, of Washington, the originator of the plan to purchase a home in Washington for Admiral Selley by popular subscription, said yesterday in Baltimore making arrangements for the organization of a subcommittee in Baltimore which shall work in connection with the central committee in Washington. She has established herself at the Hotel Remont, and will divide her time between Washington and Baltimore until the committee has been organized. "Do you think Admiral Selley's transfer of his home is likely to affect the interest in the undertaking?" Mrs. Smith was asked.

"Only temporarily, if it affects it at all," she answered. "But the transfer has made me make up my mind a new thing. When I go back to Washington I am going to use my influence with our executive committee toward having in every way, but to save him in the future from any possible loss of a wealthy home should go to his descendants."

"Mrs. Selley seems to me in the best of health. The Admiral is irrefragable a protective clause inserted in the deed for the home to Admiral Selley preventing its transfer to anybody else during the Admiral's life. At his death the widow that protective clause must be in. If the home does not go to Admiral Selley's descendants, it ought to be used as a home for the impoverished widows, mothers and orphans of soldiers." -Baltimore Sun, 22nd.
