THE LEADER IN THE NEWS AND IN CITY CIRCULATION.

Two negroes were hanged at Darlington, South Carolina, Friday for criminal assault, after being convicted by a jury. That same day, another negro was hanged at West Liberty, Ohio, and two negroes and a white woman were hanged and feathered, shot, beat and otherwise tortured because they were suspected to have set fire to a barn.

THE SOUTH AND EXPANSION.

It was stated recently that it is a fact that the South is now building out factories at the rate of one a week. To be more exact our information is that fifty-seven new cotton factories were built in the Southern States during the past twelve months. Therefore some of the mindless ones saying we are going to build so many factories that the country will be overstocked with cotton goods, and so the mills will have to shut down, and thousands of men and women will be thrown out of employment.

That is the view of the old-time. It is not the up-to-date view. There was a time when American industries depended entirely upon the foreign market, and under the Republican view of a high protective tariff our manufacturers thought little of building out and seeking trade in foreign lands. But that is an old story. The new way is to make our own goods, and to go beyond the needs of home consumption, and then to seek foreign markets for the surplus. That is what expansion means, and expansion in that sense is the best issue of this age.

One of the most interesting statements that has been made in the Southern States for a generation is that which came a short time ago from the cotton manufacturers of South Carolina. They commiserated to their representatives in Congress the fact that a large proportion of the cotton goods now manufactured in South Carolina are sold in the Chinese markets. Therefore they expect that manufacturers will be disappointed if the Government should stand by the open door in China and keep it open. That it should be closed, it would be nothing short of a disaster to the manufacturers of South Carolina, but that it should be kept open South Carolina's trade in that quarter would continue to grow.

That is the whole story in a nutshell. The South is quite capable of doubling its production of raw cotton, and so long as the markets of the world are open to us it is quite possible for the South to manufacture into cloth a large portion of the increased cotton crop, and yet find ready sale in foreign markets for every yard of the mills' own produce. We believe that the time is rapidly approaching when there will be no such thing as overproduction in this country.

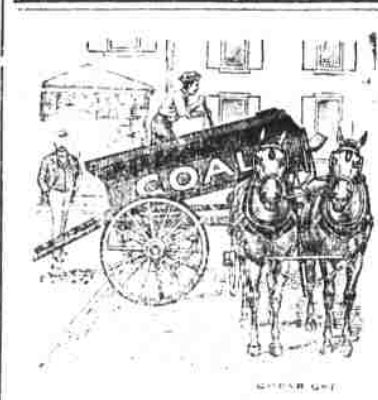
