## BOER LOSS HEAVY GOV. RUSSELL WRITES

### Royal Irish Fusiliers Loudly Cheer the Boers

### THROW THEIR RIFLES AWAY

All Ireland is in a ferment of excitement over the action of the Reserve Fusiliers on Embarking for Africa

Cork, Dec. 15.—All Ireland is in a ferment on account of the remarkable action of three hundred and sixty members of the reserves of the Royal Irish Fusiliers, who embarked yesterday at Waterford on their way to Africa to fill the gaps made in their regiment now in service in Transvaal by the recent battles there. On their way to transport the reserve Fusiliers landed from their military formation and gave three cheers for the Boers. Seats of the Fusiliers threw their rifles and accoutrements into the river. Pickets were sent out and they gathered the re-enlistments together and carried them aboard. As the transport was leaving the whole company joined in singing "God Save Ireland" and "God Save Kruger."

These delegations will be given a hearing after the examination of credentials. The claims of New York for the convention will be presented by Senator D. P. Cox and Lieutenant Governor Woodruff of Connecticut. The representatives of Philadelphia's delegation will follow, then comes Chicago and last St. Louis. After the delegations are heard it is expected that the committee will take a full session in executive session. There appears to be an open fight now on the question.
