THE CONFERENCE WELCOME.

The annual conference of the Epworth League of the North Carolina Conference convenes in this city this evening. The meetings will be held in the Edenton Street Methodist Church. The two hundred or more delegates who will be in attendance will be entertained at the homes of the Raleigh Methodists. These homes have been thrown open for the reception of the visitors of the week and there will be nothing overlooked in the efforts to give a royal good time to the visitors. The delegates will be entertained almost exclusively by Methodists, the privilege being claimed by members of that denomination, though hundreds of homes of other denominations are at the disposal of the committee on arrangements. The delegates to the conference, those who are to speak to them and the friends who accompany them are extended the most cordial welcome. The gates of the city have been thrown open to them and the freedom of the city is theirs. It is the wish of every citizen of Raleigh that their stay be pleasant and their visits often. The welcome will be always ready for the noble young men and women who are this week guests of the city.

HOW TO PROCEED.

Just what is the wisest course to be pursued at this time by those who have the matter of the erection of an auditorium in charge is a question that is giving some people a deal of food for thought. A suggestion has been made that it would be wise for the subscribers to stock to meet as soon as the necessary \$10,000 has been secured and then formulate plans for the future.

The movement has so far been a great success. This has been due to a great degree to the energetic men who were appointed to canvass the city for subscriptions, but no man or number of men could have so successfully canvassed Raleigh without a cause in which every citizen is deeply interested and which is so vital to the future welfare of this city.

Let the men who have the matter in charge get together and decide on the next step to be taken and as soon as it is possible get to work on the auditorium proper.

One thing should not be forgotten. There are a number of men who have done a good deal of talking about the necessity of an auditorium and who have cried down every plan that has been suggested, at times poor suggestions, but not always. Of this number there are more than several whose names are conspicuous by their absence from the list of subscribers.

Any man who has the welfare of Raleigh at heart will, if he is able, make some effort to assist in the undertaking.

HOW A SCHOOL FUND IS RAISED.

Here is the way the people of California go about raising a public school fund:

(1) The State levies a direct tax, which may not be less than sufficient to raise an amount equal to \$7.00 for every child of school age; a \$2 poll-tax and other taxes and appropriations raise this to \$9.43 for a child. (2) Each county is required to levy a county school tax which shall not be less than sufficient to raise an amount equal to \$6.00 for every child of school age. From these sources is raised a minimum of \$15.43 for each child. (3) If this is not sufficient to run the schools the required time (the average length of school term is 173.4 days), any school district may vote an additional tax of 30 cents on each \$100 of

taxable property. Any school district may also levy an additional tax of 30 cents on each \$100 of taxable property. Any school district may also levy an additional tax of 70 cents on each \$100 for erecting or repairing school houses.

In this way California, with a school population of 355,000 (ours is 629,000) has an annual public school fund of \$6,000,000 and public school property worth \$17,500,000.—The North Carolina Journal of Education.

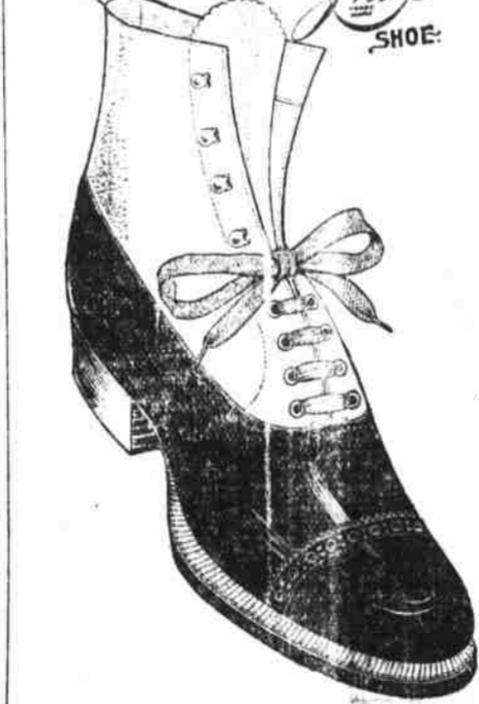

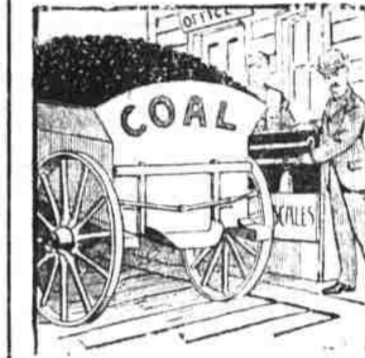
