**THE CONVENTION.**

Raleigh extends a hearty welcome to the two thousand or more gentlemen who are here participating in the greatest political meeting in the history of North Carolina. The two most noticeable features of the body upon first sight, perhaps, are first, the fine personnel of the delegates, and second, the inherent of number. In other words, the quality and quantity are the best that the Old North State, noted for her patriotic citizenship, has produced. Side by side in the convention hall are the leaders of Democracy for the past quarter of a century, and the young men who have just buckled on the armor of the party. It is an inspiring sight, old and young looking arm in arm in the mighty conflict for a common principle. The convention unquestionably represents the most intelligent citizenship in North Carolina.

The Democratic party of North Carolina has a past of which much can be said with pride. On the great scroll of its record appears the names of Vance, Holt, F. W. Davis, Manning, Sanderson, Sammons, Cole, Worth, Bain and other statesmen, who have crossed over the river, but their lives are today an inspiration for the thousands who are now laboring for the same cause that they strove for. But remember that the outward and semblance of a great party does not rest solely upon the wisdom and patriotism of its leaders but upon the great mass of the people who hold no public office, who aspire to no political position, but are content to remain private citizens of the great state. Hundreds of the delegates here today are representatives of this class and their voice is essential in the councils of the party.

This is indeed a great convention and one whose record will live for all time to come in the annals of North Carolina as marking a new epoch in the history of the State.

**RALEIGH'S AUDITORIUM.**

The Democratic State Convention in session today is comfortably accommodated in the Academy of Music, which is serving the purpose of an auditorium and which is a commodious meeting place as is to be found in any place in the State. The Convention is the largest that has ever assembled in North Carolina, but there are not two sober visitors who are not as comfortably quartered as they could possibly expect when there is such a great gathering.

Every hotel in the city is open and every effort of the managers is to give the best accommodation possible to the guests. Almost every private home in Raleigh has one or more guests and many Raleighites have let their hospitality get away with them until at night they are literally on the sleepers of the house.

That's the condition today. When the great conventions of the State meet in Raleigh two and four years from now the delegates will see a city better prepared than any other in the history of North Carolina for the convenience of the political hosts who gather. This is certain to be true. It is guaranteed by the most patriotic men that Raleigh has within its limits and their guarantee is the best that can be stamped on any movement.

There will be in the early future a large auditorium, such as will give the greatest satisfaction to all who are in attendance on the conventions or other meetings. It will be such a building as will receive the praise of the whole State and will make every North Carolinian proud of their capital.

There will be a new hotel, which, in addition to the two larger and many

smaller ones, will make the hotel accommodations better.

There will be an improved Street Car service to handle the large crowds about the city and every other facility that could be expected in a Southern city.

The kind words that the delegates have seen fit to say regarding the efforts of the citizens to make their stay thus far pleasant are greatly appreciated by the people of Raleigh. As the delegates have said Raleigh has improved and is now most progressive, but this is but the prelude to "one grand sweet song" that will be sung by all visitors as the city steadily advances on the road of success.
