A letter has been received in this city from Mrs. R. E. Chambers, a Baptist mis-sionary that her work is going on. The letter was written early in June, and no mention is made of the trouble now existing in northern China.

Mr. and Mrs. Lowe, Baptist missiona ries, were in Ping-Tu, and it is though they are safe, as they are 250 miles from the acene of the trouble. It is thought they have gone to Japan.


