BOB BURNS MORE HOUSES.

Efforts to Check Exodus of Frightened

Negroes From Louisiana. New Orleans, La., August 10.-Ernest . Carl, a one-legged man, was arrested to-day, and is being held as one of those who assisted in the burning of Thomy Lafon School, Carl claims he was at home in bed at the time the fire started, but he is being held pending action by the grand jury, which body is now investigating the riot cases, Carl was arrested because of statements made by Ernest Miller, a clerk in the Queen and Crescent Raifroad, who claims to have witnessed the firing of the negro school house.

There were four negro houses in the vicinity of the school burned last night at midnight, but the police were unable to trace the origin of the fire, as the panic-stricken negroes told contradictory

A well-attended mass meeting of negroes were held in the city last night, at which, among other resolutions, the following was adopted:

"We learn with regret that many of our good people are sacrificing their property, personal and real, and leaving the city and State as the result of the recent troubles through which we have passed. We see no necessity for this. feeling assured, as we do, of future protection, and because of the confidence we have in the authorities and the lawabiding citizens. Therefore, we urge them not to sacrifice their homes or other property in a reckless desire to feave the city. As a people we have suffered so much from such movements in the past that we should now guard against them with all possible caution.

"We also wish to express our sympa thy to the bereaved families of the police officers who were streken down in the discharge of their duties, as well as to those of all other innocent sufferers who were the victims of mob violence.
