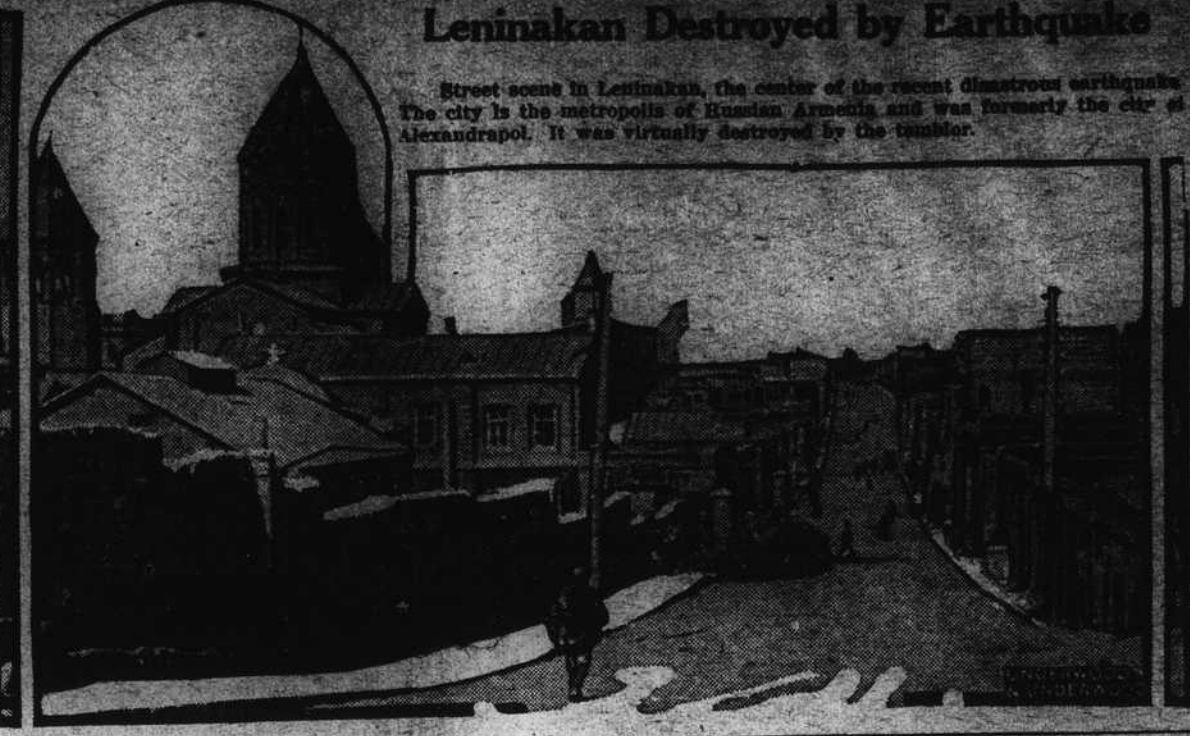

Maid Astounds Men of Science

Rumanian Peasant Girl Is Said to Be Possessed of the Devil

London.—The devil has come with me to London. The devil is very pleased to come to London, for he hopes to find plenty to do here.

Ardent reformers and religious propagandists have before now expressed the idea that the devil is a regular resident in London (and most other big cities), but the one referred to above by thirteen-year-old Eleonore Zugun would seem to be a Rumanian devil, and, so far, London's morals do not seem to have suffered greatly from the invasion.

But this Rumanian devil is greatly exercising students of psychical research and a special committee of doctors and scientists will keep Eleonore under close observation for the next month or so, in order to study its manifestations, classify the phenomenon and, if possible, banish the devil of the underworld.

For Eleonore, who is an ignorant peasant girl, looking much younger than her thirteen years and having the mentality of a child of eight, has proved a puzzle to the scientists and psychic experts of Europe for over a year. The girl believes she is devil-possessed, and the "possession" takes two distinct forms—that of "poltergeist" (or noisy devils), in which articles fly about the room in which she happens to be and disappear and reappear in bewildering fashion, and that of "stigmatic" origin, in which great weals, bites, bruises and scratches appear on her skin without apparent cause.

Studied by Scientists. It was Countess Zoe Wassilko-Serecki, well-known psychic enthusiast, who brought Eleonore to London after studying her in Rumania and in Vienna, and the scene of the proposed month's survey is the National Laboratory of Psychical Research, South Kensington. It should be said at once that the National Laboratory of Psychical Research is under the direction of Harry Price, an amateur conjuring expert, who is not at all likely to be deceived by any ordinary "magical" effects, for he knows how they are done.

"I think I know most of the 'tricks of the trade,'" said Price, referring, of course, solely to the conjuring art, "but here at the National Laboratory of Psychical Research we have no bias one way or the other. Our object is to study these phenomena and discover, if possible, their cause. We are not spiritualists, neither have we any prejudice against spiritualism. Like other scientists we want to find out the laws that govern these things.

"As regards Eleonore Zugun, while she is here she will be kept under strict observation and we shall merely report what we see and hear. I have already kept the girl under observation for three days at Vienna, and the most extraordinary thing which happened was this: A stiletto flew across the room and stuck itself with a thud into the door. I was in the room and Countess Wassilko-Serecki and Eleonore were standing together trying to fit the two halves of a broken ball together. The stiletto came from a table on the other side of the room, but although I searched the room thoroughly I could find no cause for the phenomenon."

Since her arrival at the South Kensington laboratory, Eleonore has been freely visited by newspaper reporters, but very little has happened. Some of the phenomena put down

to Eleonore's "poltergeist" influence, and vouched for by Countess Wassilko-Serecki as having occurred in Vienna are: Needles stick themselves into the girl's hands and face, and her neck and cheeks become smeared with the color from red and blue pencils without visible agency. A toneless breathy voice gives a preliminary sigh, followed by a few words in the Rumanian language. The girl has felt herself touched by a large cold hand, and seems to have a premonition of these "visits." Lump sugar from nowhere falls upon her.

All kinds of articles fly suddenly about the room, and Eleonore has never been detected in having any part in their movement. Her necklace broke suddenly at two points one day, and the corral beads were scattered over the room. While the girl was gathering these in one corner of the room, more beads fell in another corner. A skein of blue yarn disappeared

Goiter to Disappear by 1937, Is Promise

Cleveland, Ohio.—Iodine, the enemy of goiter, will serve to eradicate that disease and by 1937 it is plausible that goiter will have totally disappeared, physicians attending the annual convention of the interstate post-graduate medical assembly, were told.

Feeding of iodine to school children in the form of salts was the method advanced for combating the disease. Dr. Henry S. Plummer, Rochester, Minn., recounted the discoveries in the Mayo laboratory at Rochester five years ago which boosted iodine at once as the great goiter healer. Lack of iodine in the tissues is what causes the thyroid growths, he said.

Pay-Roll Raids Net Four Million

Twenty Persons Killed and Forty Wounded in Defending Cash.

New York.—So far this year, pay-roll bandits in the United States took a total of \$4,000,000, according to an estimate announced by the forgery prevention bureau. The number of pay-roll robberies reported for that period, it was estimated, would total more than 400, based on available newspaper reports of crimes of this kind, and it is believed these reports include less than 75 per cent of the robberies actually committed.

The estimate of a year's total of pay-roll robberies was made by a manufacturing corporation in this state, that, in October, 1925, began to keep a record of pay-roll holdups reported in newspapers throughout the country. Although special efforts were made to obtain clippings on all crimes of this character, the corporation officers do not believe their records are more than 75 per cent complete.

205 Robberies in Six Months. For the first six months the number of pay-roll robberies reported in newspaper clippings totaled 205, and the amount of cash taken by the highwaymen in these holdups was \$1,856,874. Twenty persons were killed and forty wounded in defending the money in their charge.

Analysis of the reports showed that pay-roll holdups have been notably frequent, daring and heavy in their toll of cash in New York city, California, St. Louis and East St. Louis, Chicago, Detroit and Newark, N. J. In the last named state the deaths in pay-roll holdups have amounted to at least a dozen, the operations of the bandits culminating in the desperate attack of October 14 on a mail truck in Elizabeth, in which the driver of the truck was killed, a police guard badly wounded, and \$200,000 taken by the robbers.

Of this amount \$150,000 was used for pay-roll purposes, prompting

through the lid of a workbox, returned after ten minutes and then, after another ten minutes, disappeared once more, baffling all attempts to find it.

Meanwhile Eleonore's most noticeable trait is her enormous appetite. She eats three times as much as the ordinary girl of her age, or physique. She thinks nothing of eating half a loaf of bread with a substantial breakfast.

She, herself, puts down the phenomena to her "dracu" (or devil), as she calls him in Rumanian. She is a simple-minded child, whose main delight is—toys.

200 Cannibals Attack Party Led by Americans

Batavia, Java.—A band of 200 Papuan cannibals, armed with bow and arrow, made an attack on a transport party of Dyaks belonging to the American-Dutch expedition in the New Guinea jungle country. While the Dyaks were obliged to return to the base, it appears from the meager advice received here that there were no casualties. Later the party made another start without incident. The American-Dutch expedition is headed by Prof. Matthew W. Baring, anthropologist of the University of California, and Dr. Van Lamsweerde, Dutch physician.

Further analysis of the reports showed that 51 per cent of the robberies were committed after the cash was delivered to employers for pay-roll purposes, while 49 per cent were committed on the streets, while the cash was in transit. The deduction made from this was that the armored car and heavily armed guards have caused a drift from the open attack on pay-roll cash in the streets in favor of the attack in the office after the cash has been delivered.

Postmaster General New's appeal for pay-roll payments by check has been anticipated by many of the great corporations in the country that long ago adopted the system. The American Management association recently investigated the operations of the system and reported that, aside from its unquestioned advantage of protecting both the cash and its guardians, other prime considerations in its favor were the numerous economies effected in office administration and insurance costs and its value as a promoter of thrift.
