GASTONIA, April 4.—Hunter Huss, county superintendent of education, has been re-elected for another two-year term by the Gaston county board of education, it was announced today.

The county board itself has just entered upon a new term, and has re-elected M. A. Stroupe of Cherryville as chairman and F. A. Whiteside of Gastonia as vice chairman. Other members of the board are W. J. Phary of McAdenville, E. J. Rhyne of Bessemer City, J. Milton Craig of Mount Holly, and L. D. Grubb of Dallas.

Superintendent Huss announced today application had been made to rebuild the Ranlo school, recently destroyed by fire but said it was not expected the structure could be rebuilt until after the war. The same is true, he said, of the Bessemer City high school destroyed by fire last fall.

Foreign Service

Forty-two fighting cameramen from the Army and the Office of Strategic Service photographed the scenes in North Africa in November and December of 1942. Scenes of the film include footage taken on a Mediterranean convoy in Algeria and Tunisia.

"At The Front," U. S. Film, Opens Tuesday At The Lester

CHARLOTTE, April 7.—"At the Front," the first technical color report of the American invasion of North Africa, will be shown at the Lester Theatre on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 13 and 14.

The film was made by the United States Army Signal Corps. Forty-two fighting cameramen from the Army and the Office of Strategic Service photographed the scenes in North Africa in November and December of 1942. Scenes of the film include footage taken on a Mediterranean convoy in Algeria and Tunisia.

"At the Front" pictures the first enlargement by the American and German tanks outside the Tunisian city of Tebourba, on the road north-west of Medjez el Bab; the Nazi air raid at Souk el Arab and the city of Bone; the capture of German and Italian prisoners, and the destruction of Nazi aircraft.

There are scenes that show the meeting of Lieutenant General Mark Clark with the late Admiral Darlan; American troops advancing from Bone to the front, and the United States troops making contact with the enemy.

"At the Front" is an official combat report, presented by the United States Government. No scenes are staged, rehearsed, or dramatized. This motion picture is a photographic report, just as the service cameramen saw the action, air raids, troop movements, and military activities.

"At the Front," says the Office of War Information, brings home to Americans the importance of the North African campaign, and should stimulate all citizens to a greater participation in the war effort.

CEILING ORDERED ON FARM BUTTER

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The Office of Price Administration has placed farm butter under price ceilings comparable to those for creamery butter. The OPA said that retail prices will generally not be changed by the order.

This measure, it was stated by the markets of the community, comes as a result of Government expectations and demands thrust upon them. The merchants, however, will continue to render their usual dependable services on all other days of opening. They have jointly and collectively given their patrons ample time to adjust their Wednesday needs between now and the date of their closing hour, one o'clock next Tuesday. They each expressed a desire for full co-operation on the part of the buying public.

WARTIME RATIONING GUIDE

SUGAR: Stamp No. 12 will be good for five pounds from March 16 through May 31.

FUEL OIL: Number 5 coupons are now valid and will be good for 10 gallons until September 30. Number 4 coupons good for nine gallons, will be valid until April 6.

TIRES: Holders of Ration A coupons must have tires inspected by OPA on or before March 31. Owners of passenger cars and commercial vehicles using tires smaller than 1.50 by 20 do not require certificates for recapping.

SHOES: Coupon 17 in the sugar and coffee ration book entitles each holder to one pair of shoes until June 15, when a new stamp will be designated.

COFFEE: Stamps from War Ration Book No. One are surrendered for coffee. Stamp No. 25 expired Saturday, March 21. Stamp No. 26 is valid now and until April 26. It is good for one pound.
