#### Funeral Rites Held For Sellers Infant Tuesday

Funeral rites for Shirley Ann Sellers, three-months-old daugh-ter of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Sellers were held Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock at the home with bur-ial in Mary's Grove cemetery.

The child died early Monday morning as a result of suffocation and burns suffered when the mattress of the bed on which she slept with her mother caught on fire. The mother had been smoking and apparently the cigarette shes ignited the mattress, Coroner Roscoe Lutz said. The matterss never did burst into flames but smoldered, the smoke suffebut smoldered, the smoke suffo-cating the child and burning her severely below the waist.

when Mrs. Sellers awakened about one o'clock, she noticed the smoke, caught up the child and ran into the yard to call her husband who was sleeping at a filing station nearby. The child was dead when she awoke.

CAMP RUDISILL, near here is being prepared for its 1942 summer season according to reports received here today.


