WAR BOND SALES LAG IN COUNTY

GASTONIA. — Gaston county individuals and firms bought a total of \$186,714 worth of war securities during the first two weeks of July, Co-Chairman C. D. Gray, Sec. of the Gaston county war savings committee has announced.

Since Gaston's July bond quota is over \$400,000, Co-Chairman Gray pointed out that the sales of the first two weeks show that the county is well under its quota for the first two weeks in July.

He appealed for an increase of war bond purchases during the latter half of the month to offset the gap between quota demands and actual sales during the first half of the month.

"We of the war saving committee hope that the people of the county realize more fully their obligation to the war bond program and will help put us over the top by the end of the month," Co-Chairman Gray commented.

Sales in Gaston county for the first half of the month, reported by bond classifications, were as follows: E bonds \$123,281; F bonds \$24,993; G bonds \$38,600.
