SUCCESSFUL PARENTHOOD

CHARACTER BUILT BY EVERYDAY ATTITUDES

Parents often become discouraged with trying to mold their children's characters and excuse themselves by saying, "Oh, well, nothing we prepare them for will happen anyway—they'll be up thought of." Quite true—certainly the parents of fourteen year old Lucy Bertucci couldn't have known when she was a child that she would be called upon to rescue a drowning boy. But Lucy did just that in spite of the fact that twice he pulled him down with him. When it was all over Lucy wouldn't have a thing to do with this heroic business. "I just did what I was taught to do," she said, and then added "I think it was in our etiquette lessons." I don't know when I've come across anything so revealing of the truth that character is made more from small everyday attitudes than from specific lessons about how to act in given situations. Lucy had been taught to exert herself for the comfort of others through courteous behavior, she had been taught to value human life and to be modest about her own accomplishments. And all these came magnificently to the front in the incident we have just described.

In the same way you can't tell a child to be happy and expect that to produce amiability as a life long asset. But if children live in a home where the father and the mother are happy, good-natured people, they drink in the happiness and good nature with the very air they breathe. No one talks to them about it—they just naturally acquire this desirable character trait.

Now take the opposite picture as a warning of what to look out for—the man or the woman who can't get along with other people. For all the fine qualities in the world do not make a man or a woman happy unless he can get along with other people, like them and be liked by them. Not every one can be the life of the party, not everyone has a dazzling personality, but anyone who is not warped or hurt in childhood can get along with other people. The why do some men and women fail in this most important part of living? They fail because they are resentful or jealous, because they do not trust other people or because lacking confidence in themselves they cannot let themselves go, cannot be natural and outgoing and friendly. Unhappiness at home lack of love and trust between parents and children, jealousy between brothers and sisters, too frequent failure, bringing with it a sense of inadequacy, are experiences which left unresolved, embitter a child in his relation to others. These are some of the reasons behind people who never learn to live happily with others.

Another thing, too often we think of character education only as inculcating moral virtues. And yet the way a person goes about his work is a most important part of his character. You can't make a slow child speedy nor make a quick one slow and methodical. But you can teach a slow youngster to start a job in time so that it is finished when it should be. And you can impress upon the girl the necessity for thoroughness.

No, we cannot hope to prepare our children in every respect for the world in which they live. The world changes too fast. But we can as parents realize this and keep mentally flexible enough to face courageously new problems of living. And we can keep constantly building in the young such good old-fashioned virtues as honesty, fairness, courage and kindness.

Memorial Services Should be Held

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 10.—It is believed that military memorial services for soldiers killed in action should be held wherever possible for bereaved relatives and friends, and as a consequence Chaplain John O. Lindquist Chief of Chaplain Branch, Headquarters Fourth Service Command announced today that chaplains, buglers and firing squads are available for this tribute. The custom of firing three volleys at Military funerals is believed to have originated among the Romans, who, after casting earth three times by name, after which friends and relatives of the deceased pronounced the word "Vale" (farewell) three times as they departed. So, today when the squad of soldiers fire three volleys over a grave, they are in accordance with this old Roman custom bidding their dead comrade "Farewell" three times.

The number three is considered to have mystical and symbolical significance, as for instance, the Holy Trinity and the Three Graces, as well as frequent recurrence in numerous ancient religious ceremonies. In daily life it is interesting to note the extent the number three enters into activities, such as athletics, ship saluting by blowing whistles three times when passing another ship at sea, and various other rituals.

The practice of sounding taps at military funerals involves a deeply felt sentiment—"Rest in Peace" In the daily life of the soldier the sounding of taps at 11 P.M. signifying "lights out," announces the end of the day, implying that the cores and labors of the soldier are ended for that day. So does the sounding of taps at his funeral signify the end of his day—the "lights out" of his life—his "Rest in Peace."

There is no other call so beautiful, so significant, so replete with associations of comrades dead and gone—there is no other call that arouses so much sentiment, so many emotions in the soul of the soldier as the sounding of "Taps."

Chaplain Lindquist further explained that although military services could be held for individual soldiers in most instances, still in the event the location be too far away from any camp, post or station, to make such services feasible, monthly memorial services could be so arranged and planned for a congregation of people suffering similar losses.

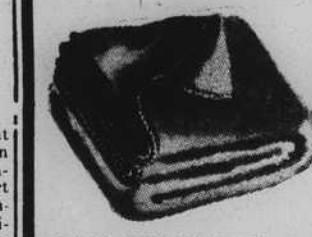
