### Rev. J. E. B. Houser Going to Conference

Rev. J. E. B. Houser, pastor of the Cherryville Methodist Circuit serving St. Paul, Beulah, Bethlehem, and Bess Chapel, will leave Monday, October 18th, for Statesville where he will attend the Methodist Conference. Mr. Houser reported at the district meeting everything paid in full for the year. He has added new members to each of his churches. The parsonage has been renovated and redecorated and many improvements made. This is Mr. Houser's third year since coming back to this charge. He is the only pastor to have served on this charge for a four year term. Services will be held at Bethlehem and Bess Chapel next Sunday and at St. Paul's and Beulah the third Sunday.

### Local Farm Loan Asso. Consolidates

Consolidation of the Gastonia National Farm Loan Association with five other associations to form a new association, which will be known as the Charlotte National Farm Loan Association, has been approved by the Farm Credit Administration, according to John F. Gaylord, Secretary, Treasurer. These associations have maintained a joint office at 725 East Trade Street, Charlotte, North Carolina, for the past seven years. Mr. Gaylord, who has been serving as secretary-treasurer, will continue in the same capacity for the new association, and Mrs. Sara Louise Killian will continue as assistant secretary-treasurer. The new association will begin business on October 1st and is authorized to accept applications for farm loans from the Federal Land Bank of Columbia in Cabarrus, Gaston, Lincoln and Mecklenburg counties. Under an agreement with the Columbia Land Bank, it will also handle collection of these loans and perform other loan services for the bank. These loans are made to farmers for terms of five to forty years at a 4 per cent interest secured by first mortgages on farm property. The consolidation was effected in order to form a stronger financial organization, reduce operating expenses, and provide better credit service to farmers in this territory. The new association is a co-operative credit organization, owned and controlled entirely by its farmer-members, its principal purpose being to obtain farm mortgage loans for farmers from the Federal Land Bank of Columbia at a low rate of interest and on terms suited to their needs. The association has an authorized capital of \$100,000, together with a substantial surplus and reserves. It has more than 600 loans outstanding aggregating over \$1,000,000. "The old Gastonia Association only served Gaston county and while it has been able to retire its stock at par to members who have paid their loans in full, the new organization is a much stronger financial set-up," Mr. Gaylord stated. "Furthermore, the new association will be closely affiliated with the Federal Land Bank of Columbia so that better farm mortgage credit service can be rendered to farmers in this section at less cost," he continued. The new association has also been designated as issuing agent for Series E War Savings Bonds. C. K. etty of Bowling Green, S. C. will represent Gaston county on the board of the new association. Other officers and directors are: H. E. McComb, president, Charlotte; M. S. Yoder, vice president, Lincolnton; R. E. Eaker, Crouse, N. C.; and H. M. Johnston, Davidson, N. C.

### 209 DAIRY HERDS BRING \$383,700.00

Brattleboro, Vt., Oct. 5.—To the dairy herd at Cottonade farm, owned by William Sutton, land, Fayetteville, have some two well-bred foundation females acquired at the recent dispersal of the nationally known Dunloggin Farm Memory that sold in the same dispersal, for \$5,500 and whose 46 progeny sold there also, for an average of \$1,241. The other heifer is a grand daughter of the famed Dunloggin Woodmaster, who has 31 tested daughters with records of more than 500 pounds of butter fat. She is carrying calf to the service of Dunloggin Woodmaster. Another buyer from North Carolina was Happy Hill Farms at Matthews, owned by Mrs. Leslie Kountze. A heifer sired by Dunloggin Farm Memory was one of the great blood cows in the establishment of the Dunloggin herd, was acquired. The 209 animals in the dispersal went for a total of \$383,700, which is the highest total ever recorded for the dispersal of a single dairy herd.

### 15 MILLION TONS OF SCRAP NEEDED

The nationwide campaign to get 15 million tons of scrap metal between now and November 15 is on. (Alabama's quota is 254,000 tons; Georgia 155,000; Florida, 87,000; North Carolina 136,500; South Carolina 87,500; Mississippi 55,000; Tennessee 220,000.) The South has taken a leading part in all war work. Last year we turned in more than our quota of scrap. This year it will be more difficult and we will have to dig deeper—but we must not fail. Military successes require tremendous amounts of war implements, and we must equip our fighting forces to go on to greater or military objectives.
