October 12, 1943

MEN AND MISSIONS SUNDAY NOVEMBER 14TH

General Dwight D. Eisenhower is one of the active supporters of the 13th annual Men and Missions Sunday to be observed November 14th under the sponsorship of the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

More than 3,000 cities are participating in this year's program. The day will be recognized around the world by the armed forces of the United States and Canada, by our churches at home and by a great many Christian churches in foreign lands.

Rev. E. S. Elliott, pastor of First Baptist Church, Resident Chairman of Cherryville, N. C., has been asked by the Laymen's Missionary Movement to enlist the cooperation of all the local churches to place special emphasis on Men and Missions Sunday at their morning services.

He will furnish all local pastors with copies of a manual outlining various ways in which the day may be observed.

General Eisenhower has contributed one of the articles for this manual of factual material prepared by the organization for use in connection with this year's observance.

The general theme of the manual—Men on Christ's Mission—is most appropriate for the day in the opinion of leading churchmen and laymen alike.

Men and Missions Sunday was originated in 1931 on the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Laymen's Missionary Movement during the depths of the World Depression as a Christian program offering one of the most prominent approaches to the building of a better world. Today the nations of the world are plunged into a total, global war and the need for Christian thinking and action is more acute than ever before.

Prof. Arthur H. Compton, renowned physicist, Harry A. Wheeler, first president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States; Mr. Charles P. Taft and other eminent laymen have been active in promoting the interest of their fellow laymen in Christian world missions. They are members of the national board of the Laymen's Missionary Movement.
