Mrs. Gus Reynolds has received the following letter from her son, Richard Reynolds, S 2, C: Nov. 13, 1943

Dear Mom, Received your letter and was glad to hear from you and that everything was OK down there same here but today was real cold.

Glad to hear that our church is doing such good work, sure wish I could go to regular church again, I go to church but it is not like yours at home, although it is carried on almost the same way, but it is on board ship. We have two kinds of services, Protestant and Catholic.

Mom, write me a long letter and tell me all about Cherryville and all about everybody there, and tell them to write me. We like to get letters from our home town. Oh, yes, Mom, find out who knows me in the American Legion and tell them I appreciate everything they sent me and I want to thank them. I think it was thoughtful of them to remember me at this time. I got the cigarettes and lots of other things and I let the other boys help me for I don't smoke but I told those vankies that the peanuts belonged to a rebel. Ha, Ha, that's all we do is argue about the Civil War and call each other Yankees and Rebels.

You know there are a thousand boys here and just lots don't get boxes from home so I thought as I didn't smoke the American Legion would not care if I divided we all enjoyed them so don't forget to thank them for me. I hope to get a leave soon, maybe not until Christmas but I hope by then.

A Soldier of the U. S. Army In India Writes About: STRIKES AND WAR

India, October 27, 1943. A few days ago, an Indian newspaper carried a news dispatch from New York, dated October 25, 1943. It stated that 6,000 miners were on strike in the Harlan County, Kentucky coal fields.

There are a number of Kentucky officers and enlisted men serving in India, and such news from our home state gives us little comfort. We men serving overseas are unable to understand how strikes can be tolerated during war. Everyone knows there are honest differences of opinion concerning wages, working conditions, hours of labor, etc. Such differences have and probably will continue to arise as long as industry exists. What can not be understood by men facing the hardships of War is why production should stop while such matters are being settled.

We know the people of Harlan County have sons in Foreign Service. We know Harlan County people have bought large quantities of War Bonds. We know they are good, loyal Americans, but when they strike during War, an explanation is difficult, no matter what else they have done that is fine and good.

What strikers in Harlan County and elsewhere do not know is what their sons and fellow Americans are going through on the many battle fronts. No one can, unless he passes through such an experience. American labor is unaware of what good fortune befalls them. A comparison with millions of laboring people in other lands would reveal astounding facts. When sons from Harlan County return from the many lands they now occupy, they will have a story to tell that will be worth listening to.

It does not seem quite a fair deal for people on the home front to go on strike, while those on the battle front still have a job to do. How would the people at home feel if we laid down our arms because we did not think we were being paid quite enough, or our working conditions did not suit us? You would think us a pretty sorry lot. Still any one at home who trades the good earth of our native land has little to complain about in comparison to those on foreign soil.

Our arms will not be laid down because the mud is deep, or the heat of the sands of the desert burns us to the bone, or in the jungle leech gnaws us while we march. We know a war could never be won that way. If enough people on the home front strike, it can not be won.

It is impossible for many Americans overseas to see any semblance of sound, fair reasoning or fair play in any situation at home which stops production of vital materials.

An officer or soldier who fails to perform his duty or carry out his orders is punished. Many are given tasks which mean death, and we know it in advance. Only the hand of fate can intercede. Still we never strike. Why should you? AN OVERSEAS OFFICER

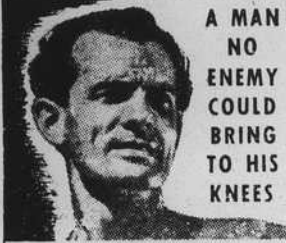
