GASTONIA HAS DROP IN CRIME

GASTONIA, Jan. 4.—Crime as reflected in court records, declined in Gastonia during the year 1943 over the previous year though the drop was very slight.

Facts and figures as relates to the offense of drunkenness which usually tops all other offenses in number of arrests, indicate a rather unusual situation.

Persons Who Know Germany Well See Early Death Slight Decrease Shown For In Cards For Faehrer Year By Records Of Courts —Drunkenness Up

By FLORA LEWIS WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.— Adolf Hitler is living on borrowed time and the loan may soon be foreclosed by his own people.

This is the belief of many people who know Germany well. They have little doubt that Hitler's fate is early death, their opinion is based on the fact that Hitler's division of opinion is about how death will come to him.

Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk of Czechoslovakia subscribes to the second school. He believes Hitler may take his own life rather than face the disillusioned people whom he led to disaster with his glittering promises.

The people of Germany will wage their war on Hitler's words of the man who once promised them the world at their feet. Hitler's remark that "if millions of people no longer possess anything to lose, they can only gain something" struck Ludwig as foolish.

Costly Words The generals are well aware that their Fuehrer's gloomy words will cost him the last enthusiasts of his following.

Ludwig's interpretation is backed up by the Soviet embassy information bulletin, which asserted that the breach between Hitler and his high command is widening.

The general's expressed dissatisfaction with the fact that he is interested in preserving Hitler's prestige predominates over all German plans, the bulletin said.

Masaryk said Hitler's whole background shows that he is a coward, and it is not a very brave thing to commit suicide. Masaryk, too, emphasized the growing resentment of the Junker generals for the fanatic leader.

The possibility of Hitler's death in no way implies an end to the war in Europe, however, sources sources declared.

The Soviet bulletin said, "The German command, irrespective of who is at its head, will of course seek to put every possible resistance in the last decisive moments of the war."
