MAJOR CHERRY HAS DISTINGUISHED RECORD



1898-Orphaned at seven, raised by grandparents. Jan. 1937-Sworn in by late Justice Herriot Clarkson as Speaker of N.C. House. Aug-1937 Became N.C. State Democratic Chairman, Serving Until 1940. 1900-1911 Worked on Uncle's Farm. 1928 Elected State Commander, American Legion, Dept. 6. Sept. 1918-As Captain of Machine Gun Company, participated in breaking Hindenburg Line.

A career of distinguished service to the citizens of North Carolina, both as a public servant in peacetime and as a machine-gun company captain during the First World War, is contained in the record of Major R. Gregg Cherry, 52-year-old Gastonia candidate for the governorship subject to the 1944 Democratic primary. Orphaned at seven, Major Cherry was raised by his grandparents, worked on the farm and later on the Trinity College campus at Durham to obtain his education. He became and has remained a successful attorney, with his legal career having been interrupted, however, in 1917 when he volunteered his services in the First World War, serving overseas and rising to the rank of captain in the regular Army and later to the rank of major in the National Guard in which he was active until 1923. Founder and commander of Gaston County's first American Legion post, he became State Commander of the N. C. Department of the American Legion in 1928. Prominent in fraternal and religious life, he is a member of the Masonic bodies, was Grand Chancellor of the Knights of Pythias in 1924 and has for many years been a member of the Board of Stewards of Gastonia's Main Street Methodist Church. He has served in every session of the N. C. General Assembly since 1931, seven terms in the House and two in the Senate. He was Speaker of the House in the regular session of 1937 and in the special sessions of 1936 and 1939. He was chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee from 1937 to August, 1940, a member of the State textbook rental commission in 1937 and of the State school commission from 1938 to 1941. In every legislative session since 1931 he has been a member of the finance committee of either the House or Senate and has held numerous other important legislative chairmanships and memberships.

nomination. However, I have ever filed notice of my candidacy with the board of elections if health is not good and in addition to that I find my business connections will call me away from the county a great part of the time and I do not feel that I will be able to devote sufficient time to the office for the next few years.

"After serving 12 years, I feel that I have given enough time to the cause. At the same time I am grateful for the confidence the people have shown me and for the many offers of support, were I to run again and continue to serve.

"I have always stood by the party and the party's nominees and will continue to do so. The act that I am declining to offer or re-nomination does not mean I am retiring from public life or even from politics, for I can still tell what the future may bring forth for me.

"Filing time does not expire until April 15 and I am making my statement now so that others may yet file for the place. I understand that there may be others who will file, since I am out of the race, who want the place." During the 12 years Mr. Beam as served as commissioner he has helped Cherryville get a new 30,000 high school building; 10,000 colored school building; resurfacing and straightening a highway at Cherryville-Dallas highway; resurfacing of road from Cherryville to Dave Beam's Store, where it joins Lincolnton highway; Getting the "Farm to Market" road under the supervision of the WPA, Gaston county sponsoring it and accommodating 65 school children, enabling them to ride the bus to and from school. This "Farm to Market" Road was the first for Gaston county. He also helped get the new \$50,000 Tryon High School and was responsible for the gymnasium at John Chavis school. Mr. Beam has helped Cherryville and community in many ways since he has been commissioner.

TIRE INSPECTION DEADLINES - A coupon holders, September 30; C-coupon holders May 31; B-coupon holders, June 30th. FUEL OIL - Periods 4 and 5 will be good through September 30. SHOES - Stamp 18 in Book One is good through April 30. Airplane stamp 1 in Book Three is good indefinitely. Another stamp, good beginning May, 1st, will be announced soon. INCOME TAX - Declarations of estimated 1944 estimated tax and first quarterly payments are due by April 15th. FOOD RATIONING NEWS - From now on all food stamps will be good indefinitely, unless advance notice of expiration is given; the Office of Price Administration has announced. Housewives may budget their purchases on the basis of three red 10-point stamps every second Sunday and five blue 10-point stamps the first of every month. To release cold storage space for other foods, all frozen fruits and vegetables will not be rationed through April 29. Lard will remain unrationed, ready-to-serve hams will be one point lower, "dry-cured" hams are to be only one point above fresh hams, and other meat point value will remain almost unchanged. Food expected to be in good supply over most of the country during the next three months are potatoes, cabbage, spinach, lettuce and other leafy greens, carrots, beets, citrus fruits, canned green and wax beans, tomatoes and other fresh vegetables, shell eggs, fluid milk, bread, flour, noodles and spaghetti. The War Food Administration says each civilian will have on the average 132 pounds of meat in 1944, or one pound more than he had on the average, yearly during the decade 1931-1940. Draft Reclassification - In an effort to assure a continuing supply of young men for the armed services, without unduly affecting those who are indispensable in war activities, the National Selective Service System has ordered reclassification physical examinations for all Class II-A and II-B occupationally deferred registrants under 26 who have not been physically examined. Local boards have been ordered to review cases of registrants under 26 in classes II-A, II-A, II-B, II-C and II-C are re-considering registrant 26 through 17 years of age. Registrants under 26 in II-A, II-A, II-B and II-C are to be reviewed and if such action is warranted are to be reclassified regardless of existing deferment termination dates. Registrants under 26 found unfit for military service or fit for limited military service only may be reclassified into II-A or II-B providing they are contributing to war production or war supporting activities. MORE NEWS ABOUT TIRES - More tires will be rationed for small trucks and farm tractors in April, but substantially fewer than in April, last year, OPA says. April quotas of new and used passenger tires are the same as for March, and the new passenger tube quota is 7.2 per cent over March. Meanwhile the War Food Administration urges farmers to withhold appeals for conversion of tractors from steel wheels to rubber tires except in cases of extreme hardship, and suggests that many old tractor tires can be reconditioned. Standard sizes of civilian highway truck tires will now have 35 per cent less crude rubber and more synthetic, according to the Office of the Rubber Director, which says that the synthetic program can fulfill our military requirements for tires. Plans for Farm Transportation - Plans for getting farm products to market and supplies to farms by motor truck include use of one farmer's truck to do what several farmers' trucks formerly did, the Office of Defense Transportation says. Wasteful practices ODT frowns upon include: transporting farm products beyond nearest practicable market; operating empty vehicles when a full or partial load is available; and the so-called subsistence farm operating with less than a full load where a regular collection service is available; operating in scheduled service over highways likely to cause undue wear - uses of a heavy or large vehicle when a lighter one is available and suitable; and hauling persons when other transportation is available. ODT and WFA officials are now explaining the ODT program in a series of regional meetings. You May Amend Tax Declaration - While declarations of estimated 1944 income tax and first quarterly payments are due by April 15th, amended declarations and payments may be made on or before the 15th day of the last month of any succeeding quarter - June 15, September 15, and December 15. The Bureau of Internal Revenue explains. When an amended declaration is made, any increase or decrease in estimated tax should be spread evenly over the remaining installments. Penalties are provided for failure to file a required declaration on time, failure to pay any installment of estimated tax on time, and substantial underestimation of tax. New Juvenile Manual Published - A new manual, "Techniques of Law Enforcement in the Treatment of Juveniles and the Prevention of Juvenile Delinquency" has just been published by the Federal Security Agency, which has a limited number of free copies for distribution to civic officials and organizations requesting them. ROUND UP - OPA actions provide that 10 thousand new passenger automobiles and 12,000 new adult bicycles will be available for April rationing. Increased ceiling prices for southern produced cordwood match previously announced 50-cent to \$1.10 per cord increases for pulpwood, and increased ceiling prices for pulpwood produced in northeastern states range up to \$2.75 a cord. Pickled, spiced and branded fruits will be restored to rationing in June to prevent large diversion of fresh fruit into these higher priced products. Retailers of cosmetics and toiletries may continue to pass on the recently increased Federal excise tax to consumers. All persons quickly receive extra amounts rationed foods they need through special handling of applications for such extra rations. Agricultural workers from Newfoundland will be bought to the Northeastern States, primarily for employment on dairy farms, WFA announces. 600,000 MAN HOURS WITHOUT FATAL ACCIDENT - General Electric's big manufacturing plant in Schenectady, N. Y. has established a safety record of more than 225,000,000 man-hours of work without a fatality, believed to be unequalled in any heavy apparatus manufacturing factory in the country. "If this record were applied to an average plant of 250 employees, this would mean 350 days without a fatality," Geo. E. Sanford, in charge of safety program, explained. MORE ABOUT REGISTRANTS TO REPORT (Continued from front page) - compared with the large number which were withdrawn at the same time from industry. As a result, he advised that there are 32,000 unmarried and deferred in agriculture as compared with 7,000 unmarried men deferred in industry. Morris went on to say that the local boards have been instructed that they must fill their call and furnish their proportionate part of the men for the armed services and that he expects a large number of the men under 26 years of age will be withdrawn from agriculture. He went on to say that the local boards in agricultural sections would have no alternatives since the situation demanded that agriculture should make its proportionate contribution of young manpower to the armed forces as has been made by industry. It is anticipated that many of the so-called subsistence farm will be idle as a result of present directives.
