### DELLINGER PREACHED IN CHARLOTTE LAST SUNDAY

Hon. David P. Dellinger filled the pulpit of Rev. David E. Bobbitt, pastor of the Green Memorial Baptist Church, at Charlotte last Sunday. Mr. Bobbitt was on a vacation. He was pastor of the First Baptist Church here for a number of years and is remembered by all our people. Mr. Dellinger reports that he has a fine church and congregation at Charlotte and is well and most favorably situated.

### MORE ABOUT MANPOWER

Workers up to their employment ceilings, will be established. These limitations may hire, are fixed as quotas, which are actually the maximum of workers the establishment of July 1 and remain effective for 60 days. Then they will be reviewed for possible changes.

The U. S. Employment Service, in following its instructions, to place any available workers in the positions of the highest urgency, is responsible for checking all orders received for workers from employers to determine (1) that the current employment of the employer at the time the order is placed is not in excess of the established ceiling and (2) that current hiring by such employer does not exceed the hiring quota established for him.

The Employment Service is directed to cease making referrals and so notify the employer whenever (1) his current employment has reached the ceiling figures, or (2) his current hiring has reached his hiring quota.

An employer desiring to hire workers must furnish the Employment Service with full information on his employment ceilings and hiring quotas, numbers and types of workers needed and his current employment, along with a weekly report on numbers of workers hired and numbers released.

North Carolina employers are not expected to violate the provisions of this order and no referrals are expected. Establishments which fail or refuse to provide information or reports required, refuse to allow manpower utilization surveys in their plants, overhire their quotas or violate the War Manpower Commission's Employment Stabilization Program are subject to having their classifications revoked, thus restricting the establishment from further hiring.

Dr. Dorton, Director, War Manpower Commission in North Carolina says, "The invasion has begun and just as our armies and navies must be geared to move at a moment's notice to new battle fronts, just as they must on a moment's notice change their plan of attack and strategy, so must we, of the civilian army of production on the home front, be so geared and prepared that we can, on a moment's notice from our commanders on the battle fronts, shift our manpower into the production of those armaments that our fighting men need."

We believe that all employers in Gaston, Lincoln and Cleveland counties will conform willingly to this regulation. It may mean inconveniences to some and even sacrifices on the part of many, but in comparison to the sacrifices and inconveniences that our boys on the fighting fronts are making, our here at home are small. So let us move forward on the home invasion front as one grand army—moving with them to final victory.

drawal as a delegate to the Democratic convention because "I couldn't conscientiously vote for the renomination of President Roosevelt." The senator added, however, he would support the nominee in the campaign.

In his letter to Hannegan, the 41-year-old Democratic chairman who will represent the President's interests at the convention, Mr. Roosevelt made no reference to the vice presidency. Nor did he throw any light on whether he wanted Vice President Wallace on the ticket with him again in his informal replies to news conference questions.

Many influential party members believe the running mate choice will be a wide open affair with the convention having more or less of a free hand in picking the winner of a race that now looks like "Wallace against the field."

### Bessemer City Exceeds Quota

Figures released Monday show that Bessemer City went "over the top" last Saturday, July 8, in the Fifth War Loan campaign. County Chairman R. H. Phinix, office announced here Tuesday morning.

Assigned a community quota of \$57,000 in E bonds, Bessemer City as of last Saturday had E bond sales of between \$60,000 and \$61,000 it was announced. Bessemer City sales of all classes of war securities, including F's and G's treasury notes, together with the E's, totaled \$188,500, it was announced.

S. A. Burts, Bessemer City community chairman in the Fifth War Loan, expressed keen gratification at what he termed "the splendid cooperation received from all those who have been connected with conducting the Fifth War Loan drive in Bessemer City" and for "the patriotic response of our people in the Bessemer City community, who have responded in such an effective manner to the appeals of the War Loan campaign."

Mrs. W. J. Eury headed the Women's Division in Bessemer City, which specialized in sales in the E bond field.

Mott Thomas headed the drive at the Algodon textile plant in Bessemer, while the drive at the Gamble mills in that community was headed by A. B. Cobb, Jr., and Miss Elizabeth Clingmyer.

### Six-Inch Sermon

Successes and Failures of Israel. Lesson for July 16; Judges 2:1-3; 7.

Golden Text: Proverbs 14:34. The lesson concerns the turbulent days "when the judges ruled." As long as Joshua lived, the Israelites prospered, but soon after his death disasters came. The new generation forsook God and, through the evil influence of the heathen left in the land, went after Baal and Ashtaroth. Strong nations about them often ravaged the country and put the Israelites under tribute. The sad statement, "The children of Israel did evil in the sight of the Lord," often occurs in the book of Judges, and also the record of God's displeasure—shown in His allowing the people to be "delivered" into the hands of their enemies.

Again and again we read of this tragic routine, through an angel appeared at Bechim to rebuke the people and though they suffered greatly because of their disobedience. But God did not allow His people to be utterly destroyed. In time a "judge" arose to deliver his people and restore a stable government. He was generally a local leader, not exercising authority over all the country. The tribes were never closely united until the time of the monarchy.

Thus we learn that the Israelites suffered through the very sin they had committed—disobeying God by failing to drive the heathen from their midst. And there is grave danger that we shall suffer in this country by and by, if we fail to cast out the evils that are found everywhere. But we also learn that God was ever concerned for His people and that He raised up deliverers for them. So will He help men now if they turn unto Him. So let us consider well the Golden Text: Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people."
