LETTERS FROM SOLDIERS



MRS. Z. M. DELLINGER RECEIVED LETTER

21 August, 1944 France Mrs. Z. M. Dellinger received the following letter from her nephew, Earl Brown:

I received your letter recently and am always pleased to hear the news from home.

I would like to write a full story of what is seen and endured over here, but honesty it is so enormous and rapid that I can't keep up with advances.

All in all what I have seen of France it is a very nice country, but the destruction is plenty. The bombed areas and means of destruction can not be written to the point that you back home can imagine the real picture.

The French are gradually drifting back to the liberated areas, usually carrying all their possessions in a small bag or on their back, and upon reaching their homes, in many cases it is destroyed. Even at that, the French are happy to be free again.

The Yanks get a hearty welcome from the natives, and in passing along the roads, very frequently they are tossing flowers into vehicles and throwing kisses to American soldiers or armed forces.

I have seen truck load, after truck load of prisoners coming back from the front. You probably can conceive what it is like.

The going has been rough and tough but every man has his shoulder to the wheel working as a team, and we believe victory is imminent, soon.

I am glad that you back home have not had to endure what the women, children, and men have over here.

I am fine and in best of health, so is my brother Burgen who is here with or near me.

In closing I wish to send my best regards to all the folks back home and remind them that with the good work they are doing, we are enabled to do likewise.

A thought for today, "Letters you write today are appreciated overseas tomorrow."

I have been to England, Scotland, Ireland, Northern France, Africa, Italy and finally Southern France. This is a nice section of coast land. The houses are very pretty. I spent several nights in one.

I sure was shocked when I received a copy of the Eagle and saw George Wright's picture on the front, "Killed in Action." George and I used to have some good times together. I am enclosing several pictures of the "Super Men" who are now running for their lives.

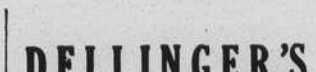

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

J. J. Niven on the Dallas Road and D. S. Rhyne, Gastonia, were clipping weeds off the pasture with a mowing machine this past week. Keeping the weeds clipped is one sure way to keep a pasture in good condition, in addition to making applications of fertilizer to stimulate grass growth. A good pasture is the best paying acre on the farm.

J. A. Rhyne, Jr., Dallas, is planning to improve the drainage on twenty acres of bottom land located on Long Creek on the Dallas-Bessemer City Road. Readings were taken up and down the bottom to determine the fall and location of drainage ditch to the creek. He plans to construct a V-type drainage channel which can be worked over and maintained with farming equipment.

Terrace lines were staked this past week on the following farms: M. F. Ormand, Bessemer City; T. A. Jones, Mount Holly; and, E. D. Pasour, Dallas, N. C.

R. C. Robinson, R-3, Gastonia, located below Robinson School, sowed approximately four acres of winter pasture mixture several days ago. He sowed a mixture of 10 pounds rye grass, 10 pounds crimson clover, and 3 bushels dairy cows some excellent grazing late winter and early spring, until the permanent pasture grasses have a chance to make some growth. Any farmer who has at least several milk cows should sow some winter-pasture mixture.

A small patch of pines were marked for thinning for M. W. Kendrick, R-3, Gastonia. He plans to thin these pines for pulpwood this winter. It pays to thin; for additional farm income during idle periods, increase growth of the remaining trees and helping to supply vitally needed war materials. Plan to thin an acre or two this winter.
