### Lt. Lewis A. Burton Killed In Action

1st Lt. Lewis A. Burton, 24, was killed in action over France, June 17, 1944, according to a message received, January 4, 1945, by his mother, Mrs. L. C. Watts, of Atlanta, Ga. He was previously listed as missing in action, as of June 17, 1944.

Lt. Burton was the grandson of Mrs. A. I. Stroup and the late Mr. Stroup of Cherryville. He attended Cherryville High School and was a member of the football team for two years. As a tribute to his friends in Cherryville, he named his P-47 Thunderbolt plane, "The Wee-Willie Cherryville Express."

Lt. Burton joined the National Guards, July, 1940, and was graduated from Officer Candidate School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, in March, 1942. He joined the Air Corps in January, 1943, and won his wings at Marianna, Florida. Prior to his leaving for overseas duty last May, he was stationed at the Dover Army Air Base, Delaware, where he served as an instructor.

In addition to his parents, Lt. Burton is survived by his wife, the former, Miss Frances Rey, of Decatur, Ga., an infant son, William Albert, his sister, Mrs. M. A. Wilson, Jr., a niece, Jo Anne Wilson and his brother, First Lieutenant Joseph A. Burton, who is now serving as an instructor at Selma Field, Monroe, La.
