



More Women Urged To Enlist In WAC

CAMP BUTNER, Feb. 18.—Unless more women enlist in the WAC immediately for service in Army hospitals "the wounded and hospitalized American soldier may Why Worry About Your Shoes? Bring them to

hospitalized American soldier may not continue to get the care to which he is entitled," it was stated today by Colonel James M. Troutt, commanding officer of the U. S. Army General Hospital at Camp Butner.

Colonel Troutt's grim warning, coming in the midst of a campaign to recruit 105 North Carolina women for training in the WAC as hospital technicians, emphasized that "Army hospital personnel is taxed to the limit" in caring for more than 30,000 wounded and ill men returning to this country monthly for hospital treatment.

He appealed to North Carolina

He appealed to North Carolina women to give serious consideration to the pressing need and to he opportunity offered them to serve their country in a highly important way. The Army nas asked that North Carolina's quota of 105 Wacs for training in hospitatechnicians be reached not later than March 20.

Colonei Troutt pointed out that any woman aged 20 to 49, inclusive, with at least two years of high school training, of good character and physical condition, can easily be trained for hospital technical work, Previous hospital experience is not necessary.

'At the moment, every Army nurse in the United States must handle 26 hospital beds — when minimum requirements call for one nurse to every 15 beds," related Colonel Troutt. "The Army is doing everything in its power to obtain more nurses. Yet there are many hospital duties which can be most efficiently taken over by Wacs. Here at Butner, Wacs have proved to be invaluable in nospital work.

"The plain fact of the matter is that unless more women are enlisted immediately for service in Army general hospitals, the wounded and hospitalized American soldier may not conunue to get the care to which he is entit-

can soldier may not continue to get the care to which he is entit-led."
