

NEW YORK, March 13 .- Frank NEW YORK, March 13.—Frank Phillips, chairman of the Board of Phillips Petroleum Co., has slash-ed his own salary to \$1 a year from \$50,000 because of heavy tax deductions, it was disclosed today.

In a message to stockholders in the March issue of "Philinews," the company's house organ, Phil-lips said that he did not see why the company should "pay out \$50,-000 a year and benefit me by only \$309.36"

Phillips explained that the big shrinkage was due to high Federal income taxes and state levies. His pay on top of his other income, he said, is subject to Federal and state taxes which leave him only \$309.36 from his salary as board chairman. The cut became effec-tive February 1.
