### Prevent Sour Milk Losses In Summer

Good sanitation coupled with a quick cooling after milking will help prevent sour milk losses and provide more good milk for the fluid milk trade and manufacturing purposes this summer. Souring of milk is caused by bacteria, which convert the milk sugar into lactic acid, says John A. Arey, in charge of Extension dairying at State College. He explains that regardless of all the sanitary precautions that can be taken, some bacteria will be introduced into the milk during the milking process. On the other hand, their development can be retarded by immediately cooling the milk after it is taken from the cow. He suggests mechanical refrigeration on those farms that have electricity, reducing the temperature of the milk to about 45 to 50 degrees. On other farms the milk can be cooled in wooden barrels. The water should come as high as the outside of the can as the milk in the can; there should be at least three times as much water in the barrel as there is milk to be cooled and the water should be changed as often as necessary to keep the milk sweet. Sanitation is very important. All vessels which come in contact with the milk should be thoroughly cleaned and sterilized after each use, according to Arey. The cow's udder should be washed and dried with a clean cloth before milking, which should be done with clean dry hands or a thoroughly cleaned and sterilized mechanical milker.

### Stay At Home For The Fourth

CHICAGO.—Planning on having yourself a time over the 4th of July, with more gas, V-E Day and all? Don't do it, suggests the National Safety Council. Instead, stay close to home, take it easy, and help prevent an avalanche of holiday accidents that would delay the knockout blow to the Japs. With an appeal to "put victory first on the Fourth," the Council is asking every citizen to enlist in a nationwide campaign to avert the usual huge holiday toll that this year would waste manpower, material and time needed to speed final victory. One hundred and thirty other national organizations have joined the Council in the holiday safety campaign, designed to help public officials, traffic officers and safety leaders hold the Fourth of July accident toll down to a minimum. "There are indications," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council, "that a lot of people are going to find it hard to resist the combination of a little more gas in the tank and the feeling that it won't be long now." "We ask the people to remember that the Japs couldn't ask for anything better than this. A 4th of July that would pile on a big accident toll and thus slow down our war effort would be a better holiday for them than for us." "Our boys out there in the Pacific will be fighting on Independence Day this year to preserve their independence. The least we can do on the home front is not to ease the holiday to hurt their efforts." "Let's take it easy, put victory first on the Fourth and be back on the job on the Fifth."

### Prisoners of War Increased Workers

ATLANTA, Ga.—The number of prisoners of war working in agriculture and industry in the seven southern states has been increased by more than 10,000. Headquarters, Fourth Service Command announced. The figures show that in industry the increase is 5,664 and in agriculture, 4,142, for a total of 9,807.

Prisoners of war working in the power industry, which means the logging, dipping and other operations in the process of manufacturing crude gum into turpentine. One of the most popular items on the menu for the military forces, the potatoes are served on about every tenth day in baked, candied or glazed forms, according to the Quartermaster Dept.

First tests on dehydrated sweet potatoes were made early in 1942. Scientists of the American Can Company being asked to work with the Quartermaster Department on various problems of packaging. The potatoes are packed in five-gallon cans especially coated for overseas shipment.

Indicative of the space saving accomplished by dehydration, officials of the Quartermaster Department say that seven and a half pounds of dehydrated sweet potatoes will serve 100 men, whereas about one bushel of the fresh potatoes would be required for the same number.

Crops in the Southern Hemisphere have been reduced by the drought. Argentina, Brazil, Australia, and the Union of South Africa are affected. This means less food for Europe.
