Man's Failures and God's Promises. Lesson for July 8: Genesis 6:5-7, 8:1, 4, 18, 20-22.

Memory Verse: Genesis 8:22. The departure of men from original purity soon had its summation in widespread wickedness. And God destroyed all living things on the earth by a deluge.

Here in Genesis we learn that only Noah and his family and the creatures with him in the ark escaped.
