A SERMON

A sermon by Bishop A. P. Robinson, Charleston, W. Va. Ezekiel 21:27 "I will overturn, overturn, overturn, it; and it shall be no more, until He comes whose right it is and I will give it Him."

Upon the ruins and devastations of the past have risen the kingdoms which are now leading the world in commerce, politics and religion. The demolition of literal Babylon, the overthrow of ancient nations proves that great failures must be experienced to make sure progress in the world's transigent populace was in the making.

The first purging of the earth of things in the book of Genesis when the earth was destroyed by water and only 8 souls were saved by means of the ark which kept them high and dry above and out of the water. Thus was the world visited the first time by the flood in the days of Noah.

The second transition and eclipse which destroyed life, liberty, civilization, and christianity, was not so much a physical death as it was a moral, intellectual and spiritual death with loss of the freedom of the soul. It was the dark ages preceded long ago by the Sun worshippers who waged a religious war led by Constantine early in the fourth century which eliminated in scenes of abomination, desolation, and debauchery for centuries of time. The whole world in the lap of wickedness perished in a different sense than physical death by the first overthrow by a flood. There was an overturn in which God's mill ground slowly but it ground exceedingly small. But after the darkness arose the bright morning star of the reformation heralded by Martin Luther; the English and American revival by the Wesleys, the Welsh revival by Evans Roberts, and the great increase of piety and religious freedom in Scotland led by John Knox. The whole world that perished by means of centuries was suddenly resurrected from chains of slavery, bondage, fetters of hope, and a long night without love, without peace, without joy, without Jesus; upon the many nations of the globe again the light shone more brightly than the moonday sun, and this is how it was overturned the second time. But the last time the world will be overturned will be during the great tribulation. "I will overturn, (with water) overturn, (with darkness) overturn, (demolish with fire) until He comes whose right it is and I will give it Him."

Supermen seek to rule the world in the air, in and under the sea, and on the land. They can only make their turn over, but God makes His overturns. He has subjugated the world by a flood. He has blinded it with a thousand years of spiritual darkness in all lands, and He will envelop it in a flame of fire and melt the elementaries of man with fervent heat. He will bind Satan in the bottomless pit consign to the lake of fire burning with brimstone, reveal the antichrist with its lightness of His coming and it shall be given Him to reign in righteousness and justice in the earth with songs of joy upon His head.
