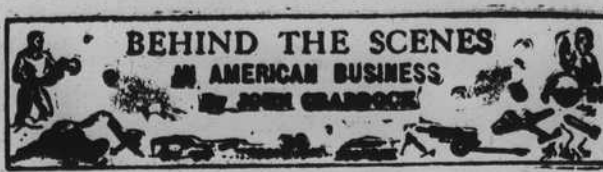

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Mark Twain's observation about the weather might well be applied to current discussions about inflation. "Everybody talks about it, but nobody does anything about it." If the public is doing anything about it, indications are that they are doing the wrong thing, and that does not apply to a small segment of the population, but to most of us. In New York, where people complain about the high cost of suburban homes one real estate man says the prices people are offering are "fantastic." In San Francisco department store owners report that "people will buy anything." Radio parts makers, who have had their ceiling prices hiked say \$2 still can not operate at a profit. Workers throughout the nation are asking higher wages, knowing full well that payrolls are the largest cost item in most businesses, and a big factor in price of the things they make. Thus everyone seems highly concerned about inflation, think someone should do something about it, but not something which would prevent them from buying what they want, or selling their products or services at the price they want.

AUTOMOBILES - Elimination or settlement of wage difference in the automobile industry would enable one of the nation's largest economic forces to contribute once more to a higher standard of living in this country. An indication of the stimulus which this industry will give to business once it gets into full swing is given by Joseph W. Frazer, president of Graham-Paige Motors and Kaiser-Frazer Corporation. Automobile dealers, he said, will pour a billion dollars into the merchandising of new cars, and employment will grow until some 10 million people are working for the automobile and related industries. Mr. Frazer estimates that the distributors and dealers of the two companies he heads will invest approximately \$100 million in showrooms and equipment. Both the Frazer and Kaiser automobile will be entirely new models and the merchandising force for both will be built around the former Graham-Paige staff. Thus far, however, the automobile industry as a whole is beginning to believe that it is easier to reconvert their plants than to reconvert the people who work in them.

THINGS TO COME - A new cleaner, said to be capable of doing six-and-one half pound vacuuming practically all the things a heavy unit can do. It has four attachments and takes up little space. A new type water cooler, only 10 inches square which can be placed on a tray or table ready for use. A method of quickfreezing, now in use by the Army makes it possible to keep whole milk for as long as three months. New eye aids are increasing. Yale University has developed a glare-reducing goggles particularly suitable for welding operations. Bausch & Lomb has perfected density sun glasses which permit fyers to look directly at the sun, yet allow horizontal vision. A new pocket radio receiver that can be carried in a handbag. They will be encased in gold, silver, morocco, pin seal, alligator, pigskin and suede to blend with madam's ensemble. Another compact washing machine, to weigh only 18 pounds. Newest in quick-frozen seafoods is lobster.

NEW WEALTH FOR AMERICA—The nation's wartime efforts to wrest every ounce of usefulness from raw materials will contribute measurably to peacetime production efficiency, and provide new sources of wealth through developments in synthetics and other new products and processes. Typical wartime example of a more widely utilized industrial raw material used dual duty service was grain. Source of the alcohol-butadiene which naced the gigantic synthetic rubber program, grain was "harvested" twice by industry. First it became war alcohol for making butadiene. Then, in by-product form, it contributed a high-vitamin ration for cattle, hogs and poultry more nutritious than the whole grain. By-product recovery and processing facilities attained an output of more than 9,000 tons of feed per month by V-J Day. Schenley Distillers Corporation reports it will continue high utilization of raw materials as its plants resume making beverage spirits after 31 months of war alcohol production. Consuming considerably less than one per cent of the nation's grain supply at capacity operation, this industry provides convincing measure of scientific study and ingenuity in the years in utilizing raw materials.

BITS O' BUSINESS - Home shortage in Los Angeles is more acute than ever; newcomers flood the city and displaced war workers hesitate to leave. As a result, the city bids fair to become the nation's third largest. U. S. experts, hoping for a complete understanding with Russia, fear it will not come for ten years. However, they are not pessimistic about current relations. Washington officials ponder the problem of huge war-purchased materials. Industrial consumers would like to siphon them out of warehouses here and abroad, fearing threat to future markets. Congressional action will be necessary before January 3 if they are to be retained by the government. Otherwise

the surplus property law specifies that they must be sold. Old line retailers burn under the collar about the comely boys who have higher ceiling prices and often sell inferior goods over the level of better merchandise in older stores.
