MISS EDITH SELENA HOYLE WEDDED TO JAMES EDWARD HORNBUCKLE

In a ceremony marked by unusual beauty and charm Miss Edith Selena Hoyle became the bride of James Edward Hornbuckle at the home of the bride on Monday at four-thirty o'clock. Rev. L. P. Barnett, pastor of the bride, officiated, using the impressive double ring ceremony. The vows were spoken before an improvised altar of palms and greenery. The mantel was adorned with figurines which were a wedding gift to the bride's parents and an oblong centerpiece of white gladioli, chrysanthemums, and fern. Seven branches of candelabra holding white candles tapered and containing crystal vases filled with white carnations, and gladioli completed the setting for the marriage vows.

Mrs. Stove Carpenter, pianist, and Miss Betty Sue Smith of Lancaster, S. C., soloist and organist of the bride, rendered a program of nuptial music. Prior to the ceremony Mrs. Carpenter played "At Dawning" by Ebenhart as arranged from Cadman's Op. 20. Miss Smith sang "At Sweet Mystery of Life" arranged by Victor Herberg and "I Love You Truly" by Carrie Jacobs Bond. The "Bridal Chorus" from Lohengrin and Mendelssohn's "Wedding March" were used during the ceremony the pianist played "O Perfect Love" by Gurney.

The bride was given in marriage by her groomer, William Edward Hoyle of Asheville. She wore a wedding gown of white net over Dutchess satin, a full skirt, a double necked yoke bound in satin, a fitted satin bodice, and elbow mitts. The finger tip veil of imported tulle was worn with a coronet of orange blossoms. Her bouquet was a white purple throated orchid encased in white carnations and showered with white satin ribbon. The bride's only ornament was a diamond cross. The bridegroom had as his best man his brother-in-law, W. A. White of Kings Mountain.

Ralph Hoyle, brother of the bride and Hugh Harrelson, her brother-in-law, served as ushers. Mrs. Hugh Harrelson, sister of the bride, was matron-of-honor. She wore a dress of romance blue net with a fitted taffeta waist and full skirt. Her head-dress was pink ostrich tips, and she carried a colonial bouquet of multi-colored chrysanthemums tied with pink satin ribbon. Miss Lawton Hoyle, sister of the bride, was maid-of-honor. She wore contrasting elbow gloves with a dress of romance blue; the full skirt was adorned with silver sequins. Her bouquet and head-dress were similar to that of the matron-of-honor. Miss Selena Hoyle, niece of the bride, was junior bridesmaid. She wore a dress of pink net and matching ribbon in her hair. She carried a colonial bouquet of multi-colored chrysanthemums tied with blue satin ribbon.

The table was covered with a lovely imported Italian applique cloth and centered with a beautiful three tiered wedding cake topped with a miniature bride and groom. Sterling silver candle holders containing white cathedral tapers tied with valley lilies adorned the table and the buffet which was centered with a sterling silver centerpiece containing carnations, and chrysanthemums.
