FIRST METHODIST CHURCH CHERRYVILLE, N. C.

Dear Fellow Church Members And Friends:

When the Wise Men came to Jesus they presented unto him gifts: gold, and frankincense, and myrrh. You will notice that the first gift was gold.

Our Church needs a gift of gold. You need not be told that our building has been destroyed by fire. This you already know. What you want to know is how great is our need. The answer is thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00).

We had thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) insurance, seven thousand dollars (7,000.00) in Government bonds, and two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) in building and loan. The architect from the Board of Church Extension told the members of the building committee that if they could secure an additional thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) that they would have a reasonable certainty of replacing the building and providing more adequate Sunday School space. Briefly this is the picture of the need on the part of our Church for the gift of gold.

We the members of the building committee would like for you to know that we enter upon the task of leading in the rebuilding of our beloved Church with humble spirits. Without your prayers and whole hearted co-operation the task will be beyond us. We are proceeding in the faith that we will all work together until once again we are walking down the aisle of our beautiful Church. If we know our hearts we want and must have your help.

How much or how many dollars shall each one give? The ultimate decision rests, of course, with the individual. We know, however, that we will all have to give and give until it hurts. If you have been carrying your part of the financial load of the Church you will do so in this, and by your doing so and carrying some of the load that will be neglected by someone else our Church will once more be ready for our worship of our Heavenly Father.

You can help if you will see some member of the building committee and not wait to be solicited. We want to pay the bills as we go and we want to be back in our Church by July 1, 1946. Remember we are counting on you to make some sacrifice in this matter.

For Soldiers Of World War Two

Tryon Post No. 100 Membership Has An Enrollment of Approximately 225.

The Tryon Post No. 100 of the American Legion have taken steps for the erection of a building suitable for a memorial to the soldiers of World War II. W. Blaine Beam, Post Commander announces that the local post has purchased a lot next to the ball park as the site for this memorial building. This lot which is 150 by 150 feet faces on North Pink and Church Streets and is considered to be a most attractive location.

Although there are no definite plans as yet as to the size, construction, and plans for the building, members of the Legion are at work on this phase of the project. solicitations from the public will be made to finance the erection of the Memorial Hall. Many communities all over the country are making similar plans so that a living memorial can be made to those who served their country in the recent strife and it is well that the Cherryville Post has undertaken such a project. The debt owed to the service men, many of whom gave their lives, is one which the people of our great nation can never repay and the erection of this Memorial Hall is one of the small things that the people of Cherryville can do as a measure of their appreciation for the sacrifices and hardships which the men from this community endured during the war.

Membership in the Tryon Post No. 100 has grown from approximately 80 to 225 in the last year and more and more men are returning from the far corners of the earth. The proposed building will offer them a suitable place for meetings and it is hoped that the public will respond whole heartedly in this plan.
