Mr. Carpenter was killed in an automobile accident in Homestead Florida when he had made his two sons, one just several years last Friday afternoon about 5 o'clock. A boat funeral service was held at Homestead on Saturday and the body shipped here where funeral services were held at St. Mark's Monday afternoon.

Mr. Carpenter was born April 1901 in the St. Mark's community, a son of the late J. S. and Selma Bevin Carpenter. He grew up in the St. Mark's Lutheran Church and became a member in early boyhood. Later he served his church as Church Councilman and was an active member and a loyal supporter of the church. In 1921 he was married to Miss Ruth Eaker and they had two children, two sons, one died in infancy.

Surviving are his widow and son Ramoth Carpenter of Greensboro, and two granddaughters, Margaret Susan and Ruth Ellen. Also surviving are three half brothers, Arthur and Clyde Carpenter of Lakeland, Fla. and Everett Carpenter of Liberty, two half sisters, Miss Myrtle Carpenter of Middlesex and Mrs. J. B. Farris of Easton, Ga.

The following paragraph was sent to me from Rev. Luther A. Thomas, pastor of Miami Beach United Lutheran Church:

"When Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter left Cherryville in 1945 to make their home in the Homestead Florida area, they took with them their desire for the church of their faith. That interest was never lost. In the community in which they made their new home there was no Lutheran Church. For a number of years they went regularly to Miami thirty miles north to worship. Later going to Miami Beach more than thirty-five miles. All this time they were working for a Lutheran Church in Homestead. It was not until January 1952 that Dr. Luther A. Thomas arranged to go to Homestead from Miami Beach for night services. This was a noted mill and known for a generation or longer as the Mrs. Susie Beam mill. Both these mills were noted places in Cleveland county and served a large part of that county.

Later we find another flour mill was built near us. That was known as the Uncle Joe Houser mill. This was located on the little creek a couple miles east of Mr. Hugh Helms store, on the north side of Flint Hill road. This was a most popular place and was operated for many years by Mr. A. L. Houser. He commenced this work long before he was grown and continued for years thereafter. Later he gave up the job and built him a home on the north side of the Flint Hill road where Mr. Carl

It was here I spent with my father to the mill. We had to stay nearly all night. One would take large loads of wheat up the creek from the present mill.

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
