N. C. Police Arrested 3,674 Motorists Over Week-End In State

RALEIGH, July 6.—The Highway Patrol reported today that it made 3,674 arrests during the week-end while it made an all-out effort to hold down the number of highway deaths over the July 4 holiday.

Despite the patrol's efforts, there were 14 deaths in the state during the holiday period as compared with 11 last year when the holiday period was one day shorter.

The arrests included 243 for reckless driving, 241 for reckless driving, 1,170 for speeding.

The speeders included 250 going 70 to 65 miles per hour, 75 caught speeding from 65 to 70 and 100 drivers who were cutting along at more than 75.

The arrests also included 262 pedestrians found drunk on the highways.

The patrol reported it issued warnings to 1,419 slow drivers and also warned 924 pedestrians.

MANUFACTURER OF HOSEY IN N. C. RISING

RALEIGH, June 29.—Just how dominant is North Carolina in the manufacture of hosey?

The question can be answered by a study of a report just issued by the National Association of Hosey Manufacturers for 1953. Director Ben E. Douglas of the State's Department of Conservation and Development said today.

This report shows that within the present century the production of hosey in North Carolina has jumped from a relatively insignificant portion to around 44 percent of the nation's output.

Of all full-fashioned hosey produced in the nation's hosey mills during 1953, North Carolina accounted for more than 47 percent, and more than 47 percent accounted for about 38 percent, and more than 47 percent of seamless. The output of the two amounted to more than 44 percent of the national total.

If the 1953 output of hosey turned out by mills located in this State were divided equally between all inhabitants of the country, according to the 1953 estimate of population, there would be more than five pairs for each man, woman and child in the nation, Douglas said.

Latest available figures, Douglas added, show that one out of every eight or nine engaged in manufacturing in North Carolina is employed in the hosey field. The total number of workers in the knit goods plants in the State was approximately 60,000. Of these more than 50,000 were hosey mill workers.

In 1953, there were 425 hosey plants in North Carolina, including the smallest units. Of the 377 having eight or more workers, 256 were engaged in rather steady employment, and 121 were full-fashioned plants employing 23,017. The other 57 firms employed 11,222 workers, who produced other knit goods such as underwear, outerwear and knit specialties.

Development of hosey manufacturing has been largely accomplished in the State through local initiative and capital, although this local growth, Douglas said, has been supplemented in an important way by outside capital. This has been a rather steady influx of companies from other states in recent years, he added.
