HOSIERY IN N. C. RISING RALEIGH, June 29.—Just how dominant is North Carolina in the manufacture of hosiery? The question can be answered by the National Association of Hosiepry Manufacturers for 1963 Director Ben E. Douglay of the State's Department of Conserva-tion and Development said today. This report shows that within the present century the produc-tion of hosiepry in North Caro-ina has jumped from a relatively insignificant portion to around 44 percent of the nation's output. Of all fell-fashioned hosiery mil-burget in the nation's hosiery mil-burget in the nation's hosiery mil-burget and more than 47 percen-tor scaless. The output of the two amounted to more than 44 percent of the national total. If the 1953 output of hosiery instate were divided equally be-two and the nation, there would be more than five pairs for each man, yournan and child in the na-tion, Douglas said. In 1953, there were 425 hosiery plants in North Carolina, includ-ing the smallest units. Of the 377 having eight ora more workers, 256 were scanless with 26,048 employed, and 121 were full-fash-iened plants employing 23,017. The other 57 firms employing 23,017. The other 57 firms employing 11, 221 workers, who produced other knit goods such as underwear, out-crewen and knit specialities. Development of hosiery manu-fit turing has been largely accom-plished in the State through local initiative and capital, although this local growth.
