million more than orders had been received for this time a year ago.

The department expects to produce and distribute about 20 million seedlings this season as compared with the record 16-million plus grown and sold during the 1953-53 season, Director Ben E. Douglas said.

"It is most encouraging to note the increasing interest in growing trees as a cash crop," Douglas added "We hope there will be at least two trees planted for everyone cut down. Landowners are realizing there is money to be made in trees."

As the seedling shipments to individual landowners be gan, State Forester Fred Claridge said "there are indications the 20 million seedlings we expect to produce this season may not be mough to supply the growing demand."

Douglas and Claridge urged all persons planning to plant trees to get their orders in as quickly as possible. Seedling applications may be made to the State Forester's office. Education Building, Raleigh, or to any district forester, county ranger, or county agent. Orders wil' se filled as re-

agent, Orders will ne filled as received.

Claridge said the supply of slash pine seedlings for the 1954-55 planting season is already sold. More than three million of this spries were grown this year.

The C&D Department officials said the State's third tree nursery which is located on Little River about three miles west of Goldstore, will produce about four million this season to add to the approximate 16 million seedlings being grown at the older nurseries located near Clayton and Hendersonville. The Goldsboro nursery, which is producing seedling this year for the first time, is expected to have an ultimate capacity of 25 million when it gets into full production.

Of the 13 million seedlings sold to date approximately four million were purchased by furniture and paper and pulp companies in the State for free distribution to FFA, 4-H Clubs, school forests, and to selected adult farmers, Claridge said.
