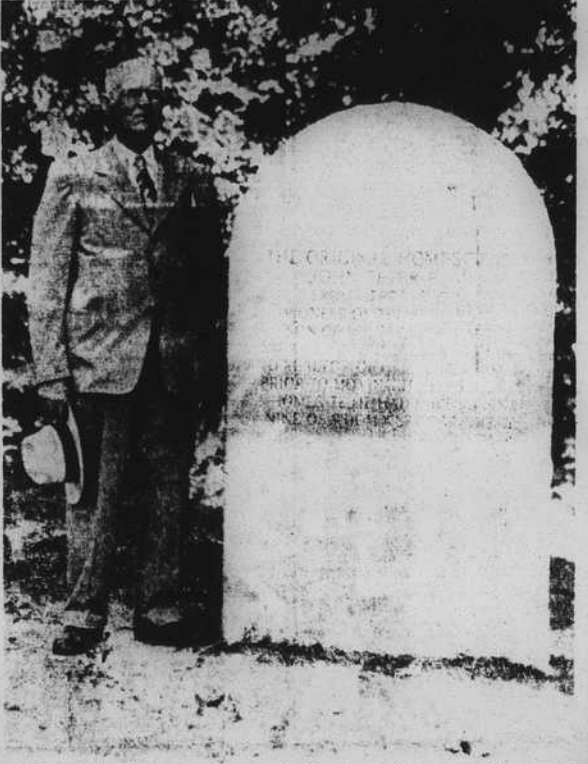
WHEREAS, the Town of Cherryville could become a town of rare beauty, aglow with pink cherry blossoms each spring.
