Glenna Dellinger Wins Homemaker Of Tomorrow

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow Contest for the Cherryville High School is Glenna Dellinger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. I. D. Dellinger, who is taking Home Economics in the senior class. She received the highest score in a written examination which tested the homemaker knowledge and attitudes of ten senior girls in the third year home economics class.

She will be entered in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She will also receive a gold award pin, cook books for herself and her school.

A scholarship of \$1,000 will be awarded each state winner, and she will receive a trip with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Philadelphia. Her school will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

The scholarship of the young woman named All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000. The 50-minute written examination designed and judged by Science Research Associates of Chicago, which is given to all participants in this national search, consisted of multiple choice and subjective questions which tested the students' attitude and knowledge in the major areas of homemaking.

BEGINNERS DAY SET IN COUNTY

Parents who have children entering school for the first time this year or in the second year or in the third year should see that immunizations are made for their children. The required immunizations are diphtheria, whooping cough, and smallpox; and they may be obtained from your private physician or at any one of the five health centers in Gaston County.

Children who have been immunized in the early years of life may need only a booster at this time. If and when the Salk or polio vaccine is definitely approved for use this Spring, a limited supply will be available through drug dealers to be administered by private physicians for children who are not eligible for the free polio vaccine.

It is recommended that no other vaccine be given at the same time that polio vaccine is administered. It will be of definite advantage to you and the community to complete other necessary "shots" well ahead of the time that you may want to give polio vaccine.

Preschool clinics will be begun earlier this year in an effort to complete them prior to the Salk vaccine program. Schedules will be released shortly. If possible, do not wait for preschool clinic date to set the necessary "shots" for the children entering school. The Beginners Day Programs will be more effective if "shots" are given elsewhere.

Location and general clinic hours of the five health centers are as follows: Gastonia—Monday thru Friday—8:30 A. M.—12 Noon and 3 to 5 P. M.

Cherryville—Tuesdays and Thursdays—1 to 3 P. M. Belmont—Mondays—2 to 4 P. M. Wednesdays—1 to 3 P. M. Fridays—10 A. M. to 12 P. M. Holly—Mondays—2 to 3 P. M. Wednesdays—10 A. M. to 12 Noon, Thursdays—1 to 3 P. M. (1st & 3rd only).
