Patrons of the Starnes Auditorium will be treated to a gala program of these hillbilly and western songs and music when Cecil Campbell and his celebrated Tennessee Ramblers make a personal appearance on its stage on Friday, March 25 at 8 P. M.



Cecil Campbell was born March 22, 1911, on a tobacco farm in Stokes County, Danbury, N. C. The youngest of eleven children, Cecil stayed on the farm until he was 21 years of age. Musically inclined, he learned to play different instruments, and sing folk songs in his spare time from the tobacco fields. Cecil left the farm and began his musical career, and is now one of the South's best-known radio and Victor recording artists. His first radio broadcasting was at radio station WSJS in Winston-Salem, N. C. From there he went to leading stations all over the Southeast such as WKDA, WHAS, WHAM, WSP, WWT, and has covered the South on personal appearance tours. Cecil has been featured in six motion pictures and is composer of many tunes such as "Hawaiian Skies," "Hawaiian Memories," "Neath Hawaiian Palms," "Tear Drops," "You'll Be Lonely," "Steel Guitar Swing," "I Love Hawaii," "Broken Hearted," "You Are Always On My Mind," "Neath Hawaiian Palms," "Steel Guitar Hop," "Midnight Boogie," "Last Night Cried," "Hawaiian Moon," "Little Hula Strack In Hawaii" and others.

The Ramblers have built a country-wide following with their outstanding RCA Victor records, which are prime favorites in juke boxes everywhere, as well as collectors of the best in folk music. Campbell, a showman to his finger tips, keeps his program moving at a fast pace, offering a wide variety of songs and music ranging from the standard hillbilly and western favorites to fast boogie woogie. In addition, the act intersperses its musical numbers with hilarious comedy cross-fire and raps.

PRIMARY TO BE HELD APRIL 26

The Town of Cherryville will hold an election on Tuesday, May 3, 1955, for the purpose of electing a Mayor, Recorder and two Commissioners. A Commissioner from Ward No. 2 and Ward No. 4 will be elected for a term of four years. The Mayor and Recorder will be elected for a two year term. Mr. E. V. Moss is Mayor at the present time, which position he has held many years. Mr. D. Ray Ballard is Recorder, which position he has held for the past two years. Mr. T. Carlyle Sumner is Commissioner from Ward No. 2 and Mr. W. D. Browne is Commissioner from Ward No. 4.

The Registration Books will be open for the registration of new voters on the following Saturdays, April 2nd, 9th and 16th. Saturday, April 23rd will be challenge day. A Primary election will be held on Tuesday, April 26th, for the purpose of nominating candidates to be voted for in the regular election, Tuesday, May 3, 1955. Said Primary to be conducted and held under the general election laws of the State.

Candidates who wish to seek the Mayors seat, the Recorders bench or serve as Commissioners from Wards two and four must file name with the City Clerk on or before 5 o'clock P. M., Friday, April 22, 1955. Mr. J. T. Allen will serve as Registrar for the election. Mr. Steve Stroup has been appointed by the Board to serve as one of the Judges for the election. Another Judge will be appointed at an early date.

Baptists Holding Chain Of Prayer

Baptists throughout the Southern Baptist Convention, which includes 22 states, Alaska, Cuba and Panama, are presently engaged in the greatest simultaneous soul-winning crusade in conversion history. As part of this major Baptist effort, 58 churches in Gaston County are supporting a round the clock day and night chain-of-prayer. The prayer chain was started on March 11 and will continue unabated until the beginning of the Baptist Revivals in April 10.

There are 64 churches in Gaston Baptist Association and several missions, with a combined membership of 26,369 persons. The Southern Baptist Convention is comprised of 8,000,000 members in 30,000 churches. The territory has been organized into zones, these being North, Central and Tropical for the revivals with dates running from March 27 to April 24. North Carolina has planned revivals in two designated areas, western and eastern, with Highway 26 being the midway point. Gaston Association falls in the western district and revival dates are April 10-24.

Special department events are being held each Friday night with emphasis on the Sunday School Training Union, Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union, and outstanding Baptist ministers and leaders are serving in the associational rallies.
